ANCHOR: It is a burning question tonight. When will the city release video of a Chicago police officer shooting a teenager armed with a knife 16 times? Chief correspondent Jay Levine is here now, and Jay, the city is really bracing for the reaction to this video.

LEVINE: To say they are concerned would be a gross understatement. You can hear it in their voices and see it in their actions. Still uncertain how people will react to the video we described. Today, for the first time, we hear the officers view of the shooting.

HERBERT: The officer firmly believed he was in fear for his life and he was concerned about the life of his fellow officers.

LEVINE: Attorney Dan Herbert knows everyone will soon see the dashcam video of what happened that night on Pulaski Road, when Laquan McDonald, armed with a knife and reportedly under the influence of drugs, was shot and killed. He says it will show an officer simply following police guidelines about the use of deadly force of the knife wielding suspect.

HERBERT: There is this 21-foot rule, which essentially talks about how an individual is a significant threat to a police officer when they are within that 21 foot boundary.

LEVINE: planning kicked into high gear at city hall and police headquarters today on the court ordered release of the video and the expected reaction. The mayor is due back from China on Monday, and the judge's deadline is Wednesday. All Chicago plain clothes police officers have been in uniform since the terrorist attacks in Paris and will remain so. And other departments are preparing to help if needed. Dean Angelo was among those at a Noon meeting with Police Superintended, Garry McCarthy.

ANGELO: This is my city. We all live here. I am concerned about the safety of my officers. I am concerned about the safety of the civilian population. It is the outside people I am concerned about. Their job is I believe to disrupt and cause problems. I think local people don't want to see their neighborhoods damaged.

LEVINE: there is new dimension to the timing of the release of the video. I am told that the investigation by state and federal authorities has now picked up steam to the point that it could determine exactly when the video will be released. A lot more on that at 6:00 tonight.

ANCHOR: at this point, there has not been an indictment. The investigation has been going on for such a long time. Why would it be a good thing to have some sort of resolution, or at least an indictment before the video is released?

LEVINE: Well, an indictment, or charges, before the video is released could in some way diffuse some of the pent up sentiment about those who would say, "13 months and no charges, no indictment. Why is this guy still on the job?" If there was an indictment, grounds for an indictment, it would change the complexion of the reaction.

ANCHOR: and investigation has gone on for so long that an indictment could come down at any minute. LEVINE: Any moment. But the deadline is the 25th of November, whether it comes before or after the video.

NYT: Chicago Set for Protests Over Shooting by the Police

CHICAGO — For months, leaders here watched as other cities faced angry demonstrations over police conduct, shootings and relations with black people, often captured in painful videos. As cities like Ferguson, Mo., Baltimore and New York have been consumed by fatal encounters involving the local police that have fueled national attention since 2014, this city managed to keep a lower profile. But Chicago now finds itself grappling with the prospect of having its own moment. The city has been ordered to release, within days, a police video of the fatal shooting of a black 17-year-old by a white police officer. Even the officer's lawyer has described the video, which the city sought for months to block from public view, as "graphic" and "violent" and "difficult to watch at some points." With the memories of discord in other cities so fresh, leaders in Chicago, which has a history of tension over race and policing, have been holding urgent private talks with community activists. Law enforcement officials are trying to anticipate what response the video may bring, and how best to prepare police forces here for that. And the mayor, Rahm Emanuel, appeared to try to calm the city, taking the unusual steps of condemning the police officer and urging prosecutors to take action in the case before the release of the video.

"In accordance with the judge's ruling, the city will release the video by Nov. 25, which we hope will provide prosecutors time to expeditiously bring their investigation to a conclusion so Chicago can begin to heal," Mr. Emanuel said Thursday.

Around Chicago, the video has become a topic of discussion, even though most people have not seen it. According to a few people who have viewed it, the video shows Laquan McDonald being struck by 16 bullets, some of them hitting him even after his body had fallen to the ground along a street on this city's southwest side in October 2014. Some of the bullets, an autopsy shows, entered the back of his body.

A lawyer for Mr. McDonald's family said the video showed him moving away from Officer Jason Van Dyke, the policeman who fired all of the shots, while at least five other officers never fired their weapons.

Dan Herbert, a lawyer for Officer Van Dyke, said his client believed the shooting was justified because he feared for the safety of himself and his colleagues. Mr. McDonald had a knife, the authorities say, and earlier punctured a squad car's tire with it and refused to drop it. The officers were approaching him, officials said, after the police got a report that a man with a knife was trying to break into vehicles in a trucking yard.

Officer Van Dyke is on administrative duty pending an inquiry by a team that includes the F.B.I., the United States attorney's office in Chicago and the Cook County state's attorney's office.

Since Thursday, when a judge ordered the video's release and set a deadline of Wednesday, many in this city have begun speculating over how and exactly when the release will occur, and what may follow. Some lawyers, officials and activists wondered aloud whether charges — either from the Cook County state's attorney or a federal grand jury — might still be possible a day or even a few hours before the video's release, and how an arrest might affect residents' responses.

Prominent Chicago activists said that protests were a foregone conclusion, but that they were not certain yet what form they may take. Charlene A. Carruthers, the national director at the Chicago-

based Black Youth Project 100, said she expected the video's release, whenever it came, to bolster efforts of her group and others to press for changes to the Police Department.

Page May, an organizer with We Charge Genocide, a Chicago group that has accused the police here of systemic misconduct, said she expected the video to awaken more people to what she saw as widespread police abuses. But Ms. May said she had concerns about the video's release given that Mr. McDonald's family has expressed reluctance.

"The folks that are going to get woke because of this video, we need to welcome them, organize them," Ms. May said. "The challenge now is how do we organize around this video without adding to the spectacle?"

The Rev. Michael Pfleger, a Roman Catholic priest and social activist on Chicago's South Side, said the police "continue to build mistrust" by not immediately firing Officer Van Dyke and other officers whose actions have resulted in large settlements. In the spring, the city agreed to pay \$5 million to the family of Mr. McDonald.

Father Pfleger said that protests would be necessary after the video's release, and that organizers were planning what form those should take. He said officials at City Hall called for peace during a conference call with community leaders on Thursday. He said he had also been invited to a meeting with the police in the coming days.

Police officials said Friday that plans for after the video's release were still being made, and provided few specifics. Anthony Guglielmi, a spokesman for the police department, issued a statement: "As you have seen over the past few years, C.P.D. works tirelessly to protect people's First Amendment rights, and residents of Chicago have exercised those rights in a peaceful way."

The Rev. Jesse Jackson, whose Rainbow PUSH Coalition is based in Chicago, said he was upset that officials had tried to withhold the video until now.

"I know it's a national disgraceful situation, and it will attract people around the country," Mr. Jackson said, adding at another point, "My greatest fear is not the protest, but if there is no protest."

Reverend Jesse Jackson is calling for a shake-up in the Chicago Police Department as it prepares to follow a judge's order and release the dash-board video of a white police officer shooting a black teenager 16 times last year.

WBBM's Mike Krauser reports Rev. Jackson stood at a memorial to young people killed on the streets in the Pullman neighborhood saying he believes Laquan McDonald was murdered by officer Jason Van Dyke and that there was a cover-up and he questioned why the investigation by the state's attorney's office has taken over a year.

"This kid is shot 16 times, police are still on the job and there have been no firings, there have been no suspensions, so we need to have a police shake-up," Jackson said.

He says he hopes people will be civil when asked whether he is concerned about a violent reaction to the video.

"The questions that you're asking, is there going to be a riot, like black people are going to riot, rebel, tear up the city but did you not ask the police department about the continued shooting of young black men?" said Diane Latiker of the organizations Kids Off The Block.

Jackson said a good start would be the indictment of the officer and those who he says covered for him.

Page May, an organizer with We Charge Genocide, a Chicago group that has accused the police here of systemic misconduct, said she expected the video to awaken more people to what she saw as widespread police abuses. But Ms. May said she had concerns about the video's release given that Mr. McDonald's family has expressed reluctance.

"The folks that are going to get woke because of this video, we need to welcome them, organize them," Ms. May said. "The challenge now is how do we organize around this video without adding to the spectacle?"

The Rev. Michael Pfleger, a Roman Catholic priest and social activist on Chicago's South Side, said the police "continue to build mistrust" by not immediately firing Officer Van Dyke and other officers whose actions have

resulted in large settlements. In the spring, the city agreed to pay \$5 million to the family of Mr. McDonald.

Father Pfleger said that protests would be necessary after the video's release, and that organizers were planning what form those should take. He said officials at City Hall called for peace during a conference call with community leaders on Thursday. He said he had also been invited to a meeting with the police in the coming days.

Dear Cabinet Members,

As you have likely heard, the City will release a video later this week showing a Chicago police officer shooting and killing Laquan McDonald, a 17 year old who was carrying a knife. Many of you may have questions about this incident, the criminal investigation, and/or the City's preparedness for any protests that may occur after the video is released.

The incident occurred on October 20, 2014. Within hours of the incident, our Independent Police Review Authority initiated an investigation. Several days later, IPRA sent the evidence in the case, including the video, to prosecutors who initiated a criminal investigation. Once the prosecutors initiated their criminal investigation, the City was required to suspend its administration investigation. The criminal investigation is being led by Cook County States Attorney Anita Alvarez and U.S. Attorney Zach Fardon, who will decide whether this officer will face criminal charges, and the City is cooperating fully.

Last week a court ordered the City to release the video of the incident by November 25th in response to a FOIA request, and we will comply with that order. Up to this point, the City had declined to release the video so as not to interfere with an active criminal investigation.

Please rest assured that we are working hard to reach out to community stakeholders, activists, elected officials, media and others in advance of the video release. Over the next day, the Mayor will be meeting personally with many leaders and activists to clarify the facts of this case and seek their assistance in making sure our City reacts peacefully.

Please feel free to share this message, including the facts of the case, with your employees as you see fit.

"Wielding" suggests he was threatening officers with it. He was not. Second, in the eleventh paragraph, in reference to the prosecutors' investigation, I would not say "their investigation is not yet complete." For all we know, it is, and, if in fact, the State issues an indictment this week we do not want to suggest their investigation is incomplete.

I have only reacted to what this statement does include. I have not focused on what it should include, but does not. But I thought Ken's point on our call this morning that the Mayor needs to make specific asks of these leaders is right. We want these folks to accept responsibility and to help us -- and the City they live in and love. And, asking them to help us shows them the respect they deserve. In terms of what those asks are, many of you have a much better basis to opine. But I would think it would include urging calm and restraint, and providing peaceful and constructive outlets for their members to express their anger and frustration.

As I am sure you have seen from the recent news coverage, a disturbing incident took place last year involving a Chicago Police Officer who shot and killed a 17-year-old who was carrying a knife. Given the seriousness of this incident, the Mayor asked that I keep you updated on the status of the investigation into the officer's conduct and the next steps to expect.

As the news coverage has also reported, there was video of this incident captured by the dashboard camera inside a responding police car. That video has been a key piece of evidence in the criminal investigation into the officer's actions. Last week, in response to a Freedom of Information lawsuit, a Cook County judge ordered the City to release the video by November 25th and we will comply.

In the meantime, the officer involved has been stripped of his police powers as the criminal investigation continues. However, existing rules prevent the Chicago Police Department from taking any further actions until the criminal investigation is complete.

As the Mayor has stated many times, the actions of this officer do not in any way represent the values of the Chicago Police Department or the values of the City of Chicago. It is our hope that the justice system uncovers all of the facts in this case so that appropriate actions can be taken against this officer to hold him accountable for his actions.

On behalf of the Mayor I want to thank you for your extra work during this very difficult time. We recognize the serious and disturbing nature of this incident and trust that the justice system will bring all of the facts to light so that our city can begin the healing process.



Mayor Emanuel Statement Regarding the Video of the Incident and the Criminal Investigation

"Police officers are entrusted to uphold the law, and to provide safety to our residents. In this case unfortunately, it appears an officer violated that trust at every level. As a result, the city's Independent Police Review Authority promptly sent this case and the evidence to state and federal prosecutors who have been investigating it for almost a year. In accordance with the judge's ruling the City will release the video by November 25, which we hope will provide prosecutors time to expeditiously bring their investigation to a conclusion so Chicago can begin to heal."

Brief Facts and Timeline for the Incident and Investigation

- On October 20, 2014 at 41st and Pulaski, a Chicago police officer shot and killed a juvenile, Laquan McDonald, who was wielding a knife.
- The Independent Police Review Authority (IPRA), a civilian independent agency, is charged with investigating all officer-involved shootings. IPRA opened its investigation into this incident within hours of the shooting. Between Oct. 20 and Oct. 28, IPRA interviewed witnesses and collected evidence.
- For every officer-involved shooting, IPRA sends the evidence to the Cook County State's
 Attorney so that state prosecutors can determine whether to pursue a criminal investigation.
 On Oct. 29, IPRA sent the evidence in this case, including the dash camera video, to the Cook
 County States Attorney's Office. The evidence was also later shared with the FBI and the Office
 of the U.S. Attorney as prosecutors initiated state and federal criminal investigation. Per
 standard practice, IPRA was then required to suspend its administrative investigation so as not
 to interfere with the criminal investigation.
- On Oct. 29, the officer was stripped of his police powers and remains on desk duty. Due to the Fraternal Order of Police (FOP) collective bargaining agreement, the City cannot take further action regarding the officer's employment until the investigation is complete.
- For almost a year the offices of the Cook County States Attorney and the U.S. Attorney have been investigating the incident and will make a decision about whether to file criminal charges.
- Once the criminal investigation is complete, IPRA will resume its administrative investigation.

Q&A

Q: Why wouldn't the city release the video?

A: The video is evidence in an active criminal investigation and a grand jury has been convened to determine whether criminal charges should be brought. We did not want to do anything that might interfere with the ongoing investigation. For example, releasing a video during a pending investigation has the potential to compromise eyewitness testimony because witnesses may

adjust their testimony to fit what they or others perceive in the video. Not releasing evidence during an ongoing criminal investigation is consistent with the longstanding practice of federal, state and local law enforcement authorities. As we stated months ago, the City planned to release the video once the investigation had concluded.

Q: Why didn't the City appeal the court's decision compelling the City to release the video?

A: Our intent was always to release the video once the investigation was concluded. Now that a court has compelled the City to release the video by November 25th, we hope the prosecutors will have enough time to bring their investigation to a conclusion and decide whether to file charges against the officer.

Q: What is the status of IPRA's investigation?

A: IPRA started its investigation immediately after the shooting. After collecting evidence and interviewing witnesses, IPRA sent the evidence to state and federal prosecutors who initiated a criminal investigation. Once the criminal investigation started, per standard practice, IPRA had to suspend its investigation so as not to interfere with the criminal proceedings.

Q: Why is this police officer still employed by CPD and collecting a paycheck?

A: The officer involved has been stripped of his police powers and is assigned to desk duty. While the Chicago Police Department can strip an officer of his or her police powers pending a criminal investigation, under the FOP collective bargaining agreement the City cannot take further action until the investigation is complete.

Young Black Organizers Decline Private Meeting with Mayor to Discuss the Video of the Execution of Laquan McDonald

CHICAGO-- Prior to the release of dash cam footage of a white Chicago police officer shooting 17 year-old Laquan McDonald 16 times, the Mayor's office is reaching out to meet with various community leaders on Monday. Young black organizers have declined the offer to meet with Rahm's administration to discuss the video and are focusing on reaching out to the people who are directly impacted by the occupation of militarized police and community disinvestment. Instead of attending a meeting at City Hall, the collective of young black organizers and activist will hold a press conference following the court appearance of 60+ people who were arrested protesting the International Association of Chiefs of Police conference that was hosted in Chicago last month.

The Mayor's office is calling on community "leaders" to control Black people's response to the execution recorded on the dashcam video to be released. It was important to deny this invitation to meet because we believe that the community has a right to respond as it sees fit. The city historically responds to peaceful

demonstrations violently and recklessly. We have no faith that the same Mayor that allowed people to starve for 34 days over a school, will be accountable to black people just because we respond calmly to a documented hate crime committed by a Chicago police officer. We also believe that leaders do not reserve the right to police people's emotions. Our responsibility is to organize public energy into impact. The people of this city deserve more transparency in meetings with the Mayor's office. We will decline any invite to meet with the Mayor's office privately. The Mayor and Superintendent Gary McCarthy need to be present at a public meeting that is centered around black people and the effects of militarized police occupation. We also demand that the Chicago Police Department refrain from responding to traumatized young black people with more violence. The presence of militarized police in riot gear incites people to riot.

Indicting cops does not change the policies that promote the violence and trauma inherent in the Chicago Police Department. Chicago has more police officers per person than any other city. Chicago police murder more civilians than any other police force in the nation. CPD has spent more than \$500 Million over the past 10 years in settlements for police misconduct. **Mayor Rahm Emanuel has fundamentally bankrupt public education to bankroll militarized police occupation and terrorism.** As Black teachers are losing their jobs and more schools in poor communities are closing, police presence is increasing. Yet, there has been no positive change against community violence while state violence continues to persist as well--both claiming the lives of more young people each year.

The purpose of this press conference is for young, Black activists and organizers that were arrested for protesting police violence last month to call young people to action and participate in opportunities to connect people to each other and outlets for solutions. We want to encourage people to find hope in each other as we collectively organize against the culture of white supremacy that seeks to systematically destroy our communities. In this moment, we must lean on each other, not the people and institutions that deny our right to life as black people. We see these institutions and the people that represent them as the common factor to state and interpersonal violence. We reject the myth of "black on black" crime and encourage mainstream media and consumers of media to focus on the humanity and life of Laquan McDonald and his family.

Young black organizers will be creating and hosting opportunities for people to take action, process, and fight for change as we are terrorized by the realities of white supremacy.

CHICAGO-- Prior to the release of dash cam footage of a white Chicago police officer shooting 17 year-old Laquan McDonald 16 times, the Mayor's office is reaching out to meet with various community leaders on Monday. Young black organizers have declined the offer to meet with Rahm's administration to discuss the video and are focusing on reaching out to the people who are directly impacted by the occupation of militarized police and community disinvestment. **Instead of attending a meeting at City Hall, the collective of young**

black organizers and activist will hold a press conference following the court appearance of 60+ people who were arrested protesting the International Association of Chiefs of Police conference that was hosted in Chicago last month.

The Mayor's office is calling on community "leaders" to control Black people's response to the execution recorded on the dashcam video to be released. It was important to deny this invitation to meet because we believe that the community has a right to respond as it sees fit. The city historically responds to peaceful demonstrations violently and recklessly. We have no faith that the same Mayor that allowed people to starve for 34 days over a school, will be accountable to black people just because we respond calmly to a documented hate crime committed by a Chicago police officer. We also believe that leaders do not reserve the right to police people's emotions. Our responsibility is to organize public energy into impact. The people of this city deserve more transparency in meetings with the Mayor's office. We will decline any invite to meet with the Mayor's office privately. The Mayor and Superintendent Gary McCarthy need to be present at a public meeting that is centered around black people and the effects of militarized police occupation. We also demand that the Chicago Police Department refrain from responding to traumatized young black people with more violence. The presence of militarized police in riot gear incites people to riot.

Indicting cops does not change the policies that promote the violence and trauma inherent in the Chicago Police Department. Chicago has more police officers per person than any other city. Chicago police murder more civilians than any other police force in the nation. CPD has spent more than \$500 Million over the past 10 years in settlements for police misconduct. **Mayor Rahm Emanuel has fundamentally bankrupt public education to bankroll militarized police occupation and terrorism.** As Black teachers are losing their jobs and more schools in poor communities are closing, police presence is increasing. Yet, there has been no positive change against community violence while state violence continues to persist as well--both claiming the lives of more young people each year.

The purpose of this press conference is for young, Black activists and organizers that were arrested for protesting police violence last month to call young people to action and participate in opportunities to connect people to each other and outlets for solutions. We want to encourage people to find hope in each other as we collectively organize against the culture of white supremacy that seeks to systematically destroy our communities. In this moment, we must lean on each other, not the people and institutions that deny our right to life as black people. We see these institutions and the people that represent them as the common factor to state and interpersonal violence. We reject the myth of "black on black" crime and encourage mainstream media and consumers of media to focus on the humanity and life of Laquan McDonald and his family.

Young black organizers will be creating and hosting opportunities for people to take action, process, and fight for change as we are terrorized by the realities of white supremacy.

Sneed exclusive: Officer who shot Laquan McDonald to be charged Tuesday

Sneed has learned a criminal probe launched by Cook County State's Attorney Anita Alvarez into the shooting death of 17-year-old Laquan McDonald is expected to result in criminal charges Tuesday against 37-year-old Chicago police officer Jason Van Dyke.

Sneed hears rumbles murder charges were on the table.

∞The shocker: If a murder charge is placed against Officer Van Dyke, it will be the first time in Chicago history an "on duty" police officer was charged with such a crime.

Any decision to file charges Tuesday against Officer Van Dyke comes in the wake of a Cook County judge's ruling last week ordering the release of an incendiary video showing a white police officer shooting McDonald, an African-American teen, whose body was riddled with 16 bullets.

On Saturday, Rev. Jesse Jackson: told the press he was hoping for a "police shakeup from top to bottom" after the release of the dashboard cam video; expressed anger Officer Van Dyke was still getting paid "while McDonald is perishing in his grave"; and called for Alvarez to step down for "failing" to charge him.

Although Alvarez would make no comment, Sneed hears she huddled with staff over the weekend preparing to weigh in on the Laquan McDonald case in advance of the release of the controversial video showing Officer Van Dyke, who is white, shooting the African-American teen on Oct. 20, 2014.

Sneed has also learned the potentially inflammatory video, which was ordered released before Nov. 25 in a ruling last by Cook County Judge Franklin Valderrama, is scheduled to be released at 3 p.m. Wednesday.

In addition to Alvarez, Mayor Rahm Emanuel and Police Superintendent Garry McCarthy had come under intense criticism for permitting Officer Van Dyke, who had been stripped of police authority, to continue to be assigned to paid desk duty ... and for keeping the video from the public eye until the "appropriate" time pending a result of a three pronged investigation.

Mayor Rahm Emanuel, who is back at work after a whirlwind business trip to China, reversed course after Judge Franklin Valderrama's stunning decision Friday and said he would not seek to have the ruling overturned.

Release of the video also prompted Alvarez to move quickly before the video was released hoping to quell any violent reaction by the public to a growing national furor over reports of unfair, premeditated treatment of black teens by white police officers.

Sneed also hears Alvarez's operatives have also been reaching out to ministers, community leaders and other members of the faith-based community asking them to spread a message encouraging peaceful protests when the video is released by the city of Chicago on Wednesday.

The charges brought by Alvarez pre-empt the result of a probe also being conducted by the Chicago branch of the FBI; a joint investigation involving Alvarez and the Independent Police Review Authority, which investigates police misconduct. Ironically, before a wrongful death lawsuit was even filed by McDonald's family — the Chicago City Council unanimously voted to approve a \$5 million settlement with them.

∞Backstory: On Oct. 20, 2014, the incident resulting in McDonald's death began when a report to 911 claimed a knife wielding man, McDonald, who was acting erratically — had threatened the complainant — and was attempting to break into vehicles in an Archer Heights trucking yard.

Two police officers, responding to the incident, ordered McDonald to drop the 4-inch folding knife, which he subsequently used to puncture a tire on one of the squad cars. McDonald, a ward of the state whose mother was in the process of seeking custody of him, reportedly ignored the warning.

While jogging away from the officers — and still wielding a knife, McDonald's erratic behavior resulted in other police officers arriving at the scene — as well as a request for a taser.

Subsequently, a squad car equipped with a dashboard camera also arrived. The video purportedly shows Van Dyke's marked SUV police vehicle pulling in front of the teen, who then veered into traffic.

At some point Van Dyke exited his car with his gun drawn and opened fire on McDonald, and pumped 16 bullets into his body. An autopsy report purportedly showed McDonald had PCP in his system when killed. Several other officers on the scene did not open fire.

A troubled teen, McDonald had no adult criminal record, but he had reportedly been arrested on juvenile complaints. Attorney Daniel Q. Herbert who is representing officer Van Dyke, has insisted his clients actions were justified and within the police department guidelines. He could not be reached immediately for comment Monday.

According to Independent Police Review Authority records, since 2006 Van Dyke has received a total of 17 citizen complaints, including three complaints within a four-year span involving excessive force-related allegations. He was also accused for making racial remarks.

While a majority of the 12,000 CPD officers have been flagged for fewer than two overall misconduct complaints, 662 police officers were repeat offenders, individually cited for 10 or more complaints each. According to an investigation of this data and other information by the organization Truthout, a nonprofit progressive news organization, last year showed 500 local officers with more than 10 misconduct complaints between 2001 and 2006 were still serving on the force as of the report's publication.

There is potential for online organizing to occur later this week. Blame has not been assigned to one individual or organizations; instead, people appear to be upset with the entire system – from the CPD, to the Mayor, prosecutors, culture, and others.

BOYKIN: This is not an opportunity for people to take advantage of a situation. This does harm to his memory. If we decide to do that, so I'm urging people to do peaceful protests.

ANCHOR: the city try today block the release of the tape. Community leaders are urging for calm. Tonight we investigate exactly who was Laquan McDonald. Carol we take a look at some of the events in Laquan's McDonald's life before the night of October 20th, 2014.

MARIN: Laquan McDonald was the son of Tina Hunter. He had a younger sister. His father played no role in his life according to attorneys for the McDonald family. The 17-year-old was near the intercession of Pulaski and 41st when police encountered him carrying a small knife.

NESLUND: It was a three inch blade in his right hand. He did not drop the knife. But that certainly was no justification or excuse to shoot him like that.



The mayor did not directly answer the question, citing an ongoing Independent Police Review Authority evaluation of the case. "Right now, you know that situation is being looked at by IPRA," Emanuel said. "So, I'm not going to comment on that." Emanuel, however, did not say why the independent authority's review prevented him from weighing in on whether he supported McCarthy's comments. Instead, the mayor chose to focus on McCarthy's recently launched "listening tour." The mayor said the idea is for McCarthy and his top district commanders to strengthen their ties in the community by talking with "religious leaders and community leaders" in their neighborhoods. Emanuel, though, bristled when asked why such an effort was necessary when McCarthy had been running the department for the last four years. "The question is not a fair question," Emanuel responded. "It's building on the introduction, four years ago, of community policing."
- -The discussion on Chicago's police practices comes as Baltimore endured violent riots this week after the funeral of Freddie Gray, a 25-year-old African-American man who died in police custody there. A reporter asked Emanuel on

Tuesday whether he had watched the coverage of the Baltimore police protests and if he worried about something similar happening in Chicago. "Of course, I watch. If the TV's on, you watch it," Emanuel responded. "This listening tour, while you do kind of watch what's happening in Baltimore, is an outgrowth of things we've been doing step-by-step methodically over the last four years and going forward. I'll be honest. There are good days at this and bad days."



The release of the video is the leading news item across the country on Tuesdays night. In addition to leading the national TV newscasts, it was on the splash page of the NYT, CNN, WSJ, Huffington Post, and USA Today among others websites. With the release of the video, the coverage is highlighting the ferocity of the officer's actions and the rawness of the footage.

The coverage is highlighting YOUR efforts to urge calm before the video was released, but also notes how upset community members are about the developments surrounding the video. Furthermore, the coverage highlights the number of questions that protestors and commentators say still linger: why did it take so long to press charges against the officer?; why wasn't the video released earlier?; why is the police superintendent still in power?

After the release of the video:

Chicago releases dash-cam video of fatal shooting after cop charged with murder Tribune

Hours after a Chicago police officer was ordered held without bond on a first-degree murder charge, the city released a shocking police dash-cam video that captured the white officer opening fire on an African American teen on a Southwest Side street, striking him 16 times and killing him.

The video is about six minutes long and appears to show 17-year-old Laquan McDonald running down the middle of Pulaski Road near 41st Street when Officer Jason Van Dyke, standing next to his SUV, opens fire.

It was released to the media after a late afternoon news conference by Superintendent Garry McCarthy and Mayor Rahm Emanuel.

. . .

The charge comes less than a week after a Cook County judge ordered the release of a video that Emanuel's administration had long sought to keep out of public view. As the mayor urged prosecutors to conclude their investigation Monday, he met with community leaders and aldermen to defend his handling of the controversy amid criticism that City Hall has not done enough to address police misconduct.

The mayor called on religious leaders and activists to encourage peaceful demonstrations even as staff prepared for the public fallout and discussed the best way to unveil the video.

The city lost its court fight last week to keep the video under wraps when the judge ruled in favor of freelance journalist Brandon Smith, who sued under the state's open records law.

Lawyers for McDonald's family, who won a \$5 million settlement from the city even before filing a lawsuit, have said none of the other officers at the scene fired a shot, according to city officials.

Chicago Officials Release Video in Shooting of Black Teenager New York Times

Chicago's police force has its own sometimes painful history, which by some estimates includes more than \$500 million in settlements and other costs over the last decade tied to police misconduct as well as reparations for black residents who said a group of officers abused and tortured them in the 1970s and 1980s.

In April, the city agreed to pay \$5 million to the McDonald family, even before a suit had formally been filed in the case.

For months, the city had refused to release the video. On Thursday, city officials reversed course after Franklin Valderrama, a Cook County judge, ordered it released. Announcing that the city would not appeal the case after being expected to, Mr. Emanuel strongly condemned the officer's actions. Officer Van Dyke "took the law into his own hands," the mayor said after charges were filed, "and now it's up to the justice system to hold him accountable."

Chicago mayor calls for calm as police release video of officer shooting teen CNN

Mayor Rahm Emanuel is asking the people of Chicago to come together and work for peace as the city braces for potential unrest.

Police released a video Tuesday showing the shooting of 17-year-old Laquan McDonald, who was killed by an officer in October 2014.

"I believe this is a moment that can build bridges of understanding rather than become a barrier of misunderstanding. I understand that the people will be upset and will want to protest when they see this video," Emanuel said. "We as a city must rise to this moment."

<u>Community reacts to release of video in Laquan McDonald case</u> Chicago Tribune

On Tuesday evening, dozens of black activists gathered on the University of Illinois Chicago campus to talk about the video's release. The group shortly after began a demonstration, marching east down Roosevelt Road. Eventually, about 150 people marched, some chanting "16 times!" Some in the group also chanted, "Don't ask me about a riot when people are dying."

The marchers blocked traffic, with Chicago police and State police trailing the group.

Parents and guardians of students in Chicago Public Schools received an email Tuesday afternoon from Janice Jackson, the district's chief education officer, alerting them of the video's release.

"This footage is sure to raise many emotions among our children, and we want you to know that CPS will do everything possible to meet their needs," Jackson wrote.

Marchers protest CPD handling of Laquan McDonald's murder Sun Times

As they marched, they chanted that the system is "guilty as hell" and began to walk south along State Street.

Lamon Reccord, 16, said he wants answers for his community. And he wants Cook County State's Attorney Anita Alvarez to step down.

"I think Anita doesn't believe in justice," Reccord said.

There was a huge scuffle between protesters and police on Balbo between Michigan and Columbus Drive that lasted about 15 minutes.

Police and protesters were wrestling on the ground. Police officers, bikes and protesters were thrown to ground. When it was over, three protesters were hauled to the squadrol.

It's not enough for Emanuel and McCarthy to urge calm. It's not enough to talk about the increased training and supervision that McCarthy says have dramatically reduced the number of police shootings on his watch. The mayor and his police chief must commit to a thorough examination and overhaul of the disciplinary process. That must come with a pledge for greater transparency, so the public can see for itself how complaints against cops are resolved.

Police officers deal with dangerous situations every day. But Chicago's history of slow or no disciplinary action creates the impression that misconduct goes unpunished. That has to change. The city must make good on its promise to put cameras in every cruiser and on every cop. And it must stop trying to hide those recordings from the public.

If not for the video, it's unlikely that Van Dyke would be facing a murder charge. Chicago wouldn't be having this important discussion.

Editorial: Justice delayed becomes justice denied Chicago Sun-Times

Events of the last year tells us we still live in a city that ducks the hard stuff.

Cook County State's Attorney Anita Alvarez waited more than a year to press charges against Van Dyke. We don't buy her argument, which she made again Tuesday, that she could not move faster because shootings by cops involve "highly complex" legal issues.

Police Supt. Garry McCarthy, in a similar act of ducking, declined until Tuesday to fire a police officer, Dante Servin, who shot into a crowd in 2012 and killed 22-year-old Rekia Boyd. McCarthy failed for two months to follow a police review board recommendation to terminate Servin.

When the superintendent finally did announce he would fire Servin — just hours before Van Dyke was charged and the video was released — he insisted, against all appearances, that this had nothing to do with trying to cool the public's fury toward the police.

So it goes when justice is delayed. After awhile, nobody is inclined to believe you.

<u>Chicago Officials Urge Calm as Police Shooting Video Is Released</u> WSJ

Mayor Emanuel, pastors and community activists have been meeting in recent days in the face of concerns the video could touch off violence in the nation's third-largest city. Such cities as Ferguson, Mo., and Baltimore have experienced rioting, looting and vandalism in response to police shootings. But there also have been peaceful protests in many U.S. cities amid a growing call for changes in the use of police force, particularly against black men.

At a Tuesday afternoon news conference, Mr. Emanuel also urged for peaceful protests. "It is fine to be passionate, but it is essential that it remain peaceful," he said.

Chicago Urban League Interim President Shari Runner called for "calm and mutual respect" in a statement this week, while saying she understands the "feelings of outrage, distrust and fear."

Other groups, such as Black Youth Project 100, a national organization of activists 35 years old and younger, declined to meet with city officials, saying attention should be put on police violence, not the potential response to the release of the video.

Chicago releases dashcam video of Laquan McDonald's fatal shooting MSNBC

In the days leading up to formal charges being lodged against Van Dyke and the city's release of the video, Chicago had begun to brace for possible unrest sparked by the raw nature of the video. Some organizers say the focus on possible violence following the release of the video is a distraction from the actual violence perpetrated against McDonald. "We are not predicting doom and gloom," McCarthy said. "We are predicting protests."

The mayor chimed in, calling the moment a time for the city to rise to the occasion. "This episode can be a moment of understanding and learning," he said.

<u>Protesters March After City Officials Release Laquan McDonald Dash-Cam Video</u> NBC Chicago

Protesters gathered on the Near West Side Tuesday evening after officials released the dash-cam video showing the fatal shooting of 17-year-old Laquan McDonald by a Chicago police officer last year.

About 75 demonstrators gathered peacefully in the 700 block of West Maxwell during a press conference with Mayor Rahm Emanuel and Chicago Police Supt. Garry McCarthy, which was scheduled for 4:30 p.m. Chicago officials released the dash-cam video after the press conference.

About 30 to 40 people later met inside an art gallery on Halsted Street following the release of the video. The group told NBC Chicago they had gathered to reflect on the video and discuss their emotions upon seeing it. As more people joined the group, they later marched to Roosevelt Road, about one block away, chanting "Is this a joke? They think it's a joke!"

Because of that same graphic video, which has been described as disturbing and violent, police and city officials tried to stop its release, citing an investigation, but a judge refused their request and set its release for Wednesday, the day before Thanksgiving.

Fearing what the city's reaction will be to the video, the mayor's office wanted to meet with the numerous black youth organizations that have mobilized around Laquan's death. Those groups—including BYP 100, Black Lives Matter: Chicago, Fearless Leading by the Youth, Assata's Daughters, #LetUsBreathe collective, We Charge Genocide and other grassroots groups—turned down that offer.

"The Mayor's office is calling on community 'leaders' to control Black people's response to the execution recorded on the dashcam video to be released," said the groups in a statement released Monday. "It was important to deny this invitation to meet because we believe that the community has a right to respond as it sees fit. ... We also believe that leaders do not reserve the right to police people's emotions."

"People have the right to free speech," McCarthy said. "They do not have the right to commit criminal acts."

Officer Jason Van Dyke, "violated basic moral standards that bind our community together" when he shot 17-year-old Laquan McDonald, Emanuel said.

"Anyone there to uphold the law cannot act like they are above the law," Emanuel said.

The mayor urged the city to heed to wishes of McDonald's family and not resort to violence seen in other cities faced with police violence.

"I understand people will be upset and want to protest," he said. "For those who choose to speak out, do it peacefully."

"People of good faith love their city," Emanuel said, adding the shooting "doesn't speak to who we are."

McCarthy: Chicago Police Won't Tolerate Rioting in Laquan Shooting DNAInfo

Chicago Police Supt. Garry McCarthy said Tuesday that people have a right to protest in the aftermath of the release of a video showing the police shooting of a teenager but "we will be intolerant of criminal behavior."

At a press conference Tuesday at the release of the video, McCarthy said: "People have right to be angry but they do not have right to commit criminal acts. We will be intolerant of criminal behavior."

"We're one of the world leaders in mass demonstrations, we're prepared to facilitate peoples' First Amendment right to free speech, but we'll be intolerant to criminal behavior," he said at the press conference which was also attended by a number of black clergymen and aldermen.

Mayor Rahm Emanuel added, "Will we use this episode and this moment to build bridges that bring us together as a city or will we allow it as a way that becomes barriers that tear us apart as a city?"

Businesses advise tenants to prepare for protests Associated Press

Businesses in Chicago are advising tenants to be prepared for protests as Chicago officials release a video showing a white police officer shooting a black teenager 16 times.

Some management companies have said they intend to operate as usual but are prepared to lock down buildings if protests become unruly.

Prominent clergy members are calling for peaceful protests and civil disobedience as the city prepares to release dash-cam video of the 2014 shooting of 17-year-old Laquan McDonald. A judge last week ordered the city to publicly release the video.

Mayor Rahm Emanuel and Police Superintendent Garry McCarthy also are calling for calm, as are McDonald's parents.

Officer Jason Van Dyke was charged Tuesday with first-degree murder.

Naturally, there is the human factor of manipulation of dash cameras and body cameras; the equipment must be turned on to capture the action, after all. Bystander footage can also be manipulated or edited, but on the whole, capturing such footage has been the difference between someone like former North Charleston, South Carolina, officer Michael Slager — who initially claimed he shot Walter Scott this year because Scott grabbed his Taser — going free or being held responsible for his actions, since his initial claims were dispelled by bystander footage. For many high-profile cases of police brutality and excessive force against black men in particular, the deciding factor has been the existence of video footage. Otherwise, it's the officer's word against a witness's — if there was a witness at all.

What Police Said About The Killing Of Laquan McDonald Before The Video Showed What Really Happened Think Progress

On Tuesday, the video finally released, and Van Dyke was charged with murder.

The video directly contradicts the account provided to the press after McDonald's death. McDonald does not "lunge" at the police or do anything threatening. It also shows Van Dyke firing repeatedly at McDonald after he is on the ground and motionless.

In April, police officer Michael Thomas Slager was charged with the murder of Walter Scott after a video contradicted the official police account.

Many police shootings are not captured on video, however. The prosecution of police officers for murder is extremely rare.

A lot of young people have been desensitized to violence because they've experienced it, witnessed it, suffered it or downloaded it from the Internet. Reality TV shows such as "48 Hours" tell real stories about real perpetrators and victims.

But nothing can prepare you for watching a Chicago police officer take aim at a young black man and pull the trigger 16 times.

Unfortunately, you can troll through YouTube and find other videos of police-involved shootings in other cities that are just as disgusting.

Tragically, some people even call it entertainment.

The chairman of the City Council's Black Caucus on Tuesday questioned why it took Cook County State's Attorney Anita Alvarez 13 months to charge a white Chicago Police officer with first-degree murder in the shooting of an African-American teenager amid concern the court-ordered release of a dashboard camera video of the shooting may be further delayed.

Ald. Roderick Sawyer (6th) said "somebody dropped the ball" in the shooting of 17-year-old Laquan McDonald and all signs point to Alvarez, who is fighting for her political life in a contested Democratic primary against two challengers, one of whom is African-American.

"It's politically motivated that you decide to do it at this time when you have generously had 10 months — I won't even go back to the full 13 months — to make a determination to file charges and didn't. Oftentimes, it takes days to make these types of determinations" when there's an incriminating video of Van Dyke firing 16 shots into McDonald's body, Sawyer said.

<u>Garry McCarthy defends timing of move to fire cop in fatal shooting of woman</u> Chicago Tribune

Chicago police Superintendent Garry McCarthy said Tuesday that politics were not at play in his decision to fire Detective Dante Servin for a fatal 2012 off-duty shooting just hours before another one of his officers was set to be charged with first-degree murder in a separate shooting of a teenager last year.

For two months, McCarthy had been weighing the decision on whether to fire Servin for the shooting of 22-year-old Rekia Boyd, after a police review board recommended termination.

McCarthy released a statement late Monday night that he would fire Servin, a decision that coincided with news that the Cook County state's attorney would charge officer Jason Van Dyke for first-degree murder after firing 16 rounds into 17-year-old Laquan McDonald, many of them as he lay prone in a Southwest Side street last October.

<u>Chicago Cop Charged With First-Degree Murder</u> Slate

Van Dyke will be the 15th police officer to be charged with either murder or manslaughter this year for shooting a civilian, according to research by Philip Stinson, a criminologist at Bowling Green State University. Stinson's research shows that between 2005 and 2014, the United States saw an average of just five officers per year facing such charges.

Officer Who Killed Laquan McDonald Has Been Charged With Murder BET

Former Chicago police officer Jason Van Dyke was charged Tuesday with first-degree murder in the killing of 17-year-old Laquan McDonald in 2014. The teenager was shot 16 times. Dyke was still an officer on paid desk duty as of Tuesday.

A Cook County judge has ordered that the video of the shooting be released by Wednesday. Chicago Mayor Rahm Emanuel has decided not to fight the order. The shooting death of McDonald did not receive major media attention when it happened in 2014, but the case has now reached national headlines.

"Police officers are entrusted to uphold the law and to provide safety to our residents," Mayor Emanuel said in a statement, according to the Chicago Tribune. "In this case unfortunately, it appears an officer violated that trust at every level."

Chicago community leaders expect protests over police shooting video Reuters

Community leaders who met with Chicago Mayor Rahm Emanuel said they expected protests on Wednesday when the city plans to release a disturbing video of an October 2014 fatal police shooting of a black teenager.

Emanuel called in community leaders and pastors for meetings on Monday aimed at preparing for public reaction to the video. The footage from a patrol car dashboard camera is being released as a result of a judicial order stemming from a lawsuit brought by a freelance journalist.

Also on Monday, the Chicago Sun-Times reported that the officer involved would face criminal charges, citing unnamed sources. A spokeswoman for the Cook County State's Attorney's office did not respond to requests for comment.

Meanwhile, Van Dyke's wife, Tiffany, set up a GoFundMe page asking for online donations for her husband's bond. Although the page did not mention her husband by name, it described him as a 15-year veteran officer "fighting for his freedom and justice."

"He is a highly decorated and respected officer," Tiffany Van Dyke wrote. "He was in a shooting that has been covered extensively by the media and we ask for your patience for all the facts to come out in the trial. We want him to be home with his family as we go through this judicial process."

The page asked for donations "very quickly" so Van Dyke can pay whatever bond is set and he can be home for the holidays.

The charges would come less than a week after a Cook County judge ordered the release of the video, which Mayor Rahm Emanuel's administration had long sought to keep out of public view. As Emanuel urged prosecutors to conclude their investigation Monday, he met with community leaders and aldermen to defend his handling of the controversy amid criticism that City Hall has not done enough to address police misconduct.

Ordered to release the video no later than Wednesday, the mayor called on religious leaders and activists to encourage peaceful demonstrations even as staff prepared for the public fallout and discussed the best way to unveil the video.

Rahm Emanuel: Killer cop took 'law into his own hands' MSNBC

Camiella Williams, a community activist who has worked closely with McDonald's family and the loved ones of other young African-Americans killed by Chicago police, said the cry for peace is simply a diversion from the truth.

"People are planting the seed of the potential of violence in the media rather than the fact that this officer shot him 16 times," Williams said. "People are focusing on the wrong thing thinking it's going to be violence. No one is really focusing on how can we shift this culture, how can we prevent this from happening again, how can we indict and convict the other officers involved in unjust killings."

Chicago cop charged with murder for shooting black teen 16 times USA Today

City officials expect a sharp reaction to the video's release, which comes as police treatment of African-American men has become hot-button issue nationally in the aftermath of high-profile incidents in New York, Ferguson, Mo., Baltimore, North Charleston, S.C., and elsewhere in the last 18 months.

Emanuel on Monday met with several pastors, community leaders and activists, to urge peaceful protests. In a separate move, Chicago Police Superintendent Garry McCarthy announced he would move to fire a police officer who was found not guilty of involuntary manslaughter earlier this year for the 2012 shooting death of Rekia Boyd.

Cook County Commissioner Richard Boykin: Honored to be here with black leaders to share our collective voice. The death of Laquan is one of the darkest moments in the history of our nation between police and community relations. The unimaginable murder has teared at the heart strings in all of us. I do believe that out of this tragedy that something good can come. If we force it to come. All of us stand collectively unified – city county state federal – to say that we demand change. Change in the police department. We demand that officers who have violations be dismissed from the police department. Taxpayers are paying too much into the investigations of these officers. Not all police officers are bad police. But for those are dismissed, get rid of them. We also stand together to demand more resources for our community. We're suffering from a lack of mental health resources, drug treatment resources, lack of jobs, job-training.

We found out that the time that he was killed he was a ward of the state. Which means he did not have a custodial parent. He cannot be lost without having an advocate for life. We need to need make sure he has advocates in death. We shared that with mayor yesterday. We certainly do not want that to get lost. He had a brief, tragic life. He was abused twice. He was molested in foster care. Now a ward of state has been killed by an agent of the state. That is a symbol of tragedy that offends the moral conscious of all people. We don't want his memory to be desecrated by acts of violence. We encourage everybody to protest loudly, but peacefully. Do not use Laquan in violent means. Do not use his death to conduct criminal acts. That would be the ultimate desecration of his memory. Why has it taken 13 months to indict the officer? We will not rest until we get answers to our questions.

Alderman Sawyer: I express the same feeling everyone here has today. I have not seen the tape yet but I am angry. To know that a child was executed on video shot 16 times makes me mad enough. And if we get to see the tape, and I say if because of the delays and inactions of the state's attorneys office, so I say we don't need to see the tape to know what happened. But it is important for it to be released to the public. I share with Chairman mitts because what happens here

happens throughout the city of Chicago Out of chaos comes calm. We want to make sure these questions are answered. We want to re-engage the public and make sure they know what's going on. We want to bring the best out of people. We want to continue to bring people up. We don't want 1968 to happen again. Part of this is engaging the public and express their feelings. Let them be angry. But let's have constructive conversations. We need answers. We all want to make this city the great one that we know it is.

Rev Ira Acree: We have a lot of pain in our community. I want to speak to the young people right now. We hear your voices. We hear you loud and clear. We feel your pain. But we ant to turn pain into power. We know protests are coming. Please let them be peaceful. We pray not to turn this city upside down. Dr. King said a riot is the language of the unheard. The African American made it possible for MRE be reelected. African Americans made it possible for Anita Alvarez to be elected. People know this does not pass the smell test. This is really asinine. I pray people turn pain into power. Do not let his blood be in vain.

Q: Will the charges against the officer make things better?

A (Mitts): No we're still angry. When you get angry, use your brain. Use your brain and fight back with everything you go. A positive change is what we want. You cannot attack our young men and expect nothing in return.

Q: What about the police superintendent?

A (Boykin): Garry McCarthy ought to go. There needs to be a serious overhaul in the police department.








3. Van Dyke Has Spent Most of His 14-Year Career as an Officer in High Crime Areas









Pfleger Tells Flock to Block Mag Mile On Friday to Protest Laquan McDonald

MAGNIFICENT MILE — One of the city's most outspoken activists is calling for a Black Friday protest on Michigan Avenue in response to the anticipated release of a video showing a police officer shooting teenager Laquan McDonald.

The Rev. Michael Pfleger told his parish at St. Sabina Church in Auburn Gresham to lead the protest during his homily Sunday, drawing on the legacy of "civil disobedience" established during the 1960s Civil Rights Movement.

"If you really want to make a statement: Black Friday is coming up. The number one business day," Pfleger said. "Don't shop on Black Friday and go down to Michigan Avenue and sit down in the street and block the street on Michigan Avenue with civil disobedience peacefully, and say 'business as usual can't go on while our children are dying."

The call for protest came a few days after a judge ruled the city must release dashcam video from last year showing Officer Jason Van Dyke shooting McDonald, a 17-year-old with a knife, 16 times. The video will be released by Wednesday, prompting Mayor Rahm Emanuel and other officials to brace for the subsequent outcry.

Meanwhile, Pfleger is using it as a call for families to "make a statement" on the busiest shopping day of the year, in Chicago's most prominent retail stretch, about police-involved shootings. Another Chicago police officer, Dante Servin, was acquitted of all charges earlier this year in the 2012 shooting death of 22-year-old Rekia Boyd.

"Why is Jason Van Dyke, why is he not fired?" Pfleger said during his homily. "You paid \$5 million in a settlement. if you paid \$5 million in a settlement you must think he's guilty. Fire his butt."

The Sun-Times reported Monday afternoon that Van Dyke will receive criminal charges Tuesday, and the video is expected to be released at 3 p.m. Wednesday. The Cook County State's Attorney's office did not confirm that.

"The state's attorney's office has been engaged in an active and ongoing investigation into the shooting death of Laquan McDonald," a spokeswoman with the Cook County State's Attorney's Office said Monday. "We have been working with our investigative partners at the federal level to conduct a comprehensive investigation."

Pfleger's remarks drew applause throughout the mega South Side church, 1210 W. 78th St., whose audience Sunday included cast and crew of the "Chi-Raq" movie. Filmmaker Spike Lee also addressed the parish Sunday.

Associated Press: Emanuel Meeting Ministers to Discuss Police Shooting Video

Amid concerns about possible unrest, Chicago Mayor Rahm Emanuel invited ministers and community activists to City Hall on Monday to discuss the upcoming release of a video that shows a white police officer fatally shooting a black teenager last year.

Seventeen-year-old Laquan McDonald was shot 16 times. Police have said he refused to drop a knife.

There is growing concern in the community about what could happen when people see the incident for themselves. A judge last week ordered the police department to release the police car dashcam footage by Wednesday.

Two ministers invited to meet with Emanuel said they think the mayor will solicit their help in preventing the kind of unrest seen in Baltimore and <u>Ferguson</u>, <u>Missouri</u>, after the killings of young black men by police in those cities.

"We are assuming he is going to ask us to call for calm," the Rev. Marshall Hatch said.

Emanuel's office characterized the meeting as something "we regularly do on important topics." But Hatch and the Rev. Ira Acree said it is a rare occurrence and shows the mayor is concerned there might be violence.

"We have been trying to meet with the mayor since the beginning of the year to talk about community relations and his staff asks for a letter and says 'We'll get back to you,' but they never do," Acree said.

Hatch said: "This has the feeling of them scrambling."

The shooting occurred on Oct. 20, 2014, as police responded to a 911 call of a man carrying a knife. Lawyers for McDonald's family who have seen the video say it shows the teen with a small knife and walking away from officers. They say Officer Jason Van Dyke opens fire from about 15 feet and keeps shooting after the teen falls.

Emanuel's meeting with ministers and activists comes as residents brace both for the video's release and for word on whether Van Dyke will face criminal charges. The FBI and the Cook County State's Attorney's Office are investigating the shooting, and an announcement on state or federal charges could come as soon as this week.

Acree and Hatch said blacks in the city are upset about the shooting and because city officials and the Police Department refused for several months to release the video until ordered to do so by a judge. They said people also are angry because the officer, though stripped of his police powers, has been assigned to desk duty and not fired.

"They had the opportunity to be a good example and a model across the country on how to improve police and community relations and they missed it," Acree said.

The Police Department has said it refused to release the video out of concern that doing so would hamper the federal and state investigations. The department said placing an officer on desk duty after a shooting is standard procedure and that it is prohibited from doing anything more during the investigations.

Due to the recent media spotlight on officer-involved deaths of minorities, there is a lot of anger in neighborhoods served by the Chicago Police Department. CHS believes that the possibility of an officer being targeted by gang members is extremely high. The possibility of rioting is high, given the propensity for violence to occur due to anti-police sentiments in many neighborhoods on the west side of Chicago.

CHS has heard specific threats from street gang members in the area of Augusta and Sacramento to Augusta and Western. In addition to these locations. These threats have named the uniformed patrol officers of the Chicago Police Department as targets. CHS believes the two primary locations of concern to be the 14th District Police Station and the Homan Square building. With regard to both locations, CHS has heard discussions of gang members "setting up" and waiting for police employees to exit the buildings to walk to their cars.

CHS knows these employees are typically getting off shift and may not have their protective equipment, such as bullet-resistant vests and weapons, with them. In addition to being unarmed or unprotected, these employees will likely be in either small groups or by themselves, which would make them targets of opportunity. CHS states that shooters may lay in wait for police officers, and then conduct an ambush.

In addition to ambushing police officers at the police stations, CHS states another tactic discussed is to lay in wait for police vehicles to drive down one-way streets with dead ends. After the marked unit has entered the block, one group of shooters will fire rounds into the air from a hidden location, in order to bring the moving vehicle to a halt. After the vehicle has halted, another group of shooters closer to the stopped police unit will then open fire upon the stopped unit, with the goal of killing any police officers inside the vehicle.

CHS has heard a lot of rhetoric lately that many people believe police officers will murder innocent civilians. Some believe the only way to end police brutality is to murder police officers in retaliation. In addition to conducting murder, CHS believes severe property damage will occur if riots are allowed to develop. CHS advises all uniformed police officers, and police employees entering/exiting police buildings are targets of opportunity which will be exploited by shooters if they are given the advantage.

FRANCES RIVERA: want to take you to chicago now where a news conference held regarding a police officer facing murder charges in the shooting death of a black teenager. that officer turned himself in this morning. let's listen in.

[CLIP BEGINS]

ANITA ALVAREZ: working with partner in a marked patrol car, assigned to the overnight shift in the chicago police department's 8th district. the circumstances leading up to the shooting that evening began at 9:47 p.m. when a chicago police dispatcher radioed to an 8th district beat car this a citizen was holding a male who had caught -- who had been caught breaking into trucks and stealing radios in a parking lot near 41st and killdeer. that male was identified as laquan mcdonald. the radio dispatches were broadcast to all 8th district patrol units. 9:53 p.m., a responding beat car related that the guy is walking away with a knife in his hand. and a dispatcher inquired as to whether any available units had a taser. another beat car responded immediately that they were on their way. although they did not indicate whether or not they had a taser. one minute later, a responding officer radioed that the suspect was walking toward a nearby burger king restaurant located on polaski road. the dispatcher confirmed the location, reminded all units that the individual was armed with a knife and they then continued to ask if the officer units were in close proximity. at 9:56 p.m., one of the responding beat car officers radioed that the suspect had just used the knife to slash the tire on their squad car. seconds later, beat car 545r radioed that they were two blocks away from the incident. beat car 845r was the responding police unit in which officer vandyke was a passenger. the squad was being driven by his

partner. seconds later, two additional police officers responded through radio transmissions that they were on their way, as well. at that point, a total of eight officers including this defendant and his parter in had arrived on the scene in four vehicles to assist the officers who had the initial contact with laquan, none of these officers were equipped with tasers. the dash camera of one of the responding beat cars captured the shooting but no audio was recovered. although some of the other responding units had operating dash cams, due to their positioning, they did not capture the actual shooting, nor do they contain audio recordings, investigators recovered video from a local business that showed laquan walking away from the initial officers at 40th street. attempts to download video from another local business were unsuccessful but it was determined that the cameras at that location would not have captured the scene of the actual shooting, finally, video from a third local business was recovered but due to the distance and obstructions that video was deemed to be very limited evident ri value, the video shows laguan mcdonald as he jogs south on polaski road passing the burger king at the 9:57:25 p.m. time stamp on that video. the recording shows two other marked chicago police suvs on the scene. at that time, laquan was walking and as he passes one of the responding police cars he waves a right arm and a knife is visible in the right hand, five seconds later, officer vandyke and his partner park their vehicle and immediately draw their weapons. at this time, laquan mcdonald is approximately one foot from the white lane divider in the middle of polaski road going southbound, and his body appears to be moving slightly away from the officers toward the west side of polaski. 9:57:36 mcdonald crossed white lane divider away from the officers and officer vandyke has taken at least one step toward mcdonald with his weapon drawn, the officer then opened fire on laguan whose arm jerks, his body spins around and he falls to the ground, while laguan is falling to the ground, the defendant takes at least one more step towards him at which point the angle of the dash camera changes and we can no longer see the officer within the frame of the video, two seconds later, laguan mcdonald is lying in the street on his right side. and the video capture what is appears to be two puffs of smoke coming from the ground near his body. these puffs of smoke were later identified as clouds of debris caused by the fired bullets. at 9:57:51 mcdonald is still lying on the street and the last visible shot is fired. in the 13 seconds that he's been on the ground, his body has jerked and his arms moved slightly. there have been three visible puffs of debris indicating shots hit the pavement near mcdonald's body. mcdonald and kicks the knife out of his hand, the knife later recovered by police had a 3-inch blade that folded into the handle. officer vandyke -- in the shots when he looked at vandyke and saw that he was preparing to reload his weapon. officer vandyke's partner related that he could hear mcdonald struggling to breathe and told vandyke to hold the fire to approach mcdonald and kick the knife away, officer vandyke was armed with a .9 millimeter pistol and a 16round capacity, chicago police investigators later recovered 16 fired cartridge cases from the scene and illinois state police determined that all those cartridge cases had been fired from officer vandyke's weapon, our investigation has determined that he was on the scene less than 30 seconds before he started shooting. in addition to the fact that all evidence indicates that he began shooting approximately six second after getting out of his vehicle, analysis of the video establishes that 14 to 15 seconds passed from the time the defendant fired his first shot to clear visual evidence of a final shot. for approximately 13 of those seconds, laquan was lying on the ground. on the right -- of the eight are more officers on the scene. it was only the defendant who fired his weapon. laquan had a pulse at the time chicago fire department paramedics arrived at the scene but lost the pulse in transportation to mt. sinai once at the hospital, life hospital. saving efforts were unsuccessful and he was pronounced dead. according to the interviews with officers on the scene, laquan mcdonald never spoke to the officers, never responded to their numerous verbal commands to top the knife. the first officer said they did not see the need to use force against mcdonald when they encountered him and he began running away towards polaski and sirens could be heard. several citizens witnessed the shooting. he saw mcdonald in the street before he was shot, the motorist said he was looking for a way to get away from the police, the mortorist stated mcdonald never did anything threatening to the officers before he was shot and fell to the ground. this witness stated that he heard a pause in the shots after mcdonald fell to the ground but then heard more shots. he also said that he did not see mcdonald do anything threatening while lying on the ground to cause the officer to continue to shoot, based upon this, and other evidence, it is my determination that this defendant's actions of shooting laquan mcdonald when he did not pose an immediate threat of great bodily harm or death and subsequent actions of shooting mcdonald on the ground after previously being struck by gun fire were not justified and they were not a proper use of deadly force by this police officer, before i take questions, i would like to make a couple of important points, my office was made aware of this shooting by the independent police review authority within two weeks of the incident. we received a copy of the video on november 4th, 2014. and we immediately opened an investigation and began working with the independent review police authority to gather information on this case. november 19th, 2014, we were contacted by the fbi regarding the shooting and we provided a copy of the video to the fbi the following day, at

this time, the fbi offered to work with our office and we accepted that officer. uent, i met with the fbi special agent in charge and united states attorney in december of 2014. and from that time on, we were engaged in an active, joint, ongoing criminal investigation at both the state and the federal levels. the public needs to know that while it would seem to some that the 12 months of investigation with our federal partners has taken too long, investigations of police shootings and misconduct are highly complex matters that carry with them very unique legal issues that must be fully examined and taken into consideration. for example, almost all cases of police misconduct and excessive force include garity issues and let me explain that to you, when we investigate police shootings it is not like one civilian shooting another. it is much more complex and involved, there are many things that you need to know as the investigating agency, as a prosecutor, one of those things are the use of force model, you need to know what that use of force model is, you need to know how officers are trained, what it means, in particular, what the department is trained, what are the rules and regulations? what are the specific training that chicago police officers receive in regards to use of force? you have to know the relevant case law and there's a controlling case called garrity and maybe this might be a lot to explain but i think it's extremely important, but that's the controlling case that controls cases that when we investigate police shootings, you know, the united states supreme court has ruled that officers can use deadly force and they can use reasonable force. but you must look at the point of what is the perspective of the officer at the time of the shooting, the garrity case is specific because garrity case explains when we as prosecutors can and cannot use a statements of police officers in obtaining information and bringing our charges if any, and we go through great, great pain to make sure that our assistant state's attorneys are doing it the right way, that the assistant u.s. attorney's office, that these assistants are following the law. we have to make sure that there's only certain people who are able to read these statements, we have to make sure that the assistant state's attorney making the decision on the case is not tainted by a statement that falls under garrity protection. so we have to -- i know this may sound -- it's very complicated. it's extremely complicated when you investigate police shootings. so, with that being said, you know, this investigation was tenacious, it was meticulous, we did everything to make sure that we were not going to jeopardize our case because if we do and we use tainted evidence obtained against garrity ruling, the indictment will be dismissed so we want to make sure that we are following all of the rules and making sure that everything is done. and so, that's why this investigation and all police investigations take a significant amount of time. the bottom line is these cases unlike most cases require a meticulous examination that can seem to the passive observers to be taking too long, however, the unique and complex nature of these issues means that these cases are time consuming, requiring a massive an labor intensive effort, it is not at all unusual for these type of investigations to take up to 20 months before reaching a charging decision, and this case in particular many people from the fbi, the united states attorney's office and my office have been working tirelessly to reach just conclusion. at the end of the day, i'd rather take my time and get it right than rush to judgment and get it among, rushing to judgment simply has no place in a professional investigation of this magnitude and could only serve to jeopardize justy being done. throughout the course of this investigation it was our intention to announce our charging decisions and our conclusions jointly and simultaneously with the united states department of justice and u.s. attorney's office and myself, that was our goal, to stand up here together jointly announcing our respective decisions. in order to do -- we wanted to seek with one united voice, with everyone who's involved in this very, very thorough investigation. however, i made a decision after that, after that plan that the -- after the cook county judge ruled last week that the videotape would be released to the public at the -- as a result of the civil litigation with the city of chicago. while we would have preferred for the investigation to have run its full course and enabled our federal partners to complete their evaluation in its entirety, i felt compelled in the interest of public safety to announce these state charges today, maintaining public safety is my number one job and i do not want the public to view this video without knowing the very important context that with these charges we are bringing a full measure of justice that this demands, to be clear, the judge's order that the city of chicago must release the video by november 25th certainly moved up the timing of our announcement beut it did not dictate our decision to charge this defendant with first-degree murder. I made that decision internally weeks ago. as you know, the citizens of chicago will soon have the opportunity to view the video for them. throughout the course of our investigation i have seen the video on a number of occasions and i can tell you it is everything that has been described to be by the news accounts. it is graphic, it is violent, it is chilling, i've been a prosecutor for nearly 30 years, i have personally investigated and prosecuted numerous cases of misconduct and public corruption, involved in hundreds of murder investigations and trials and seen some of the most violent and graphic evidence and crime scene photos that you can only imagine. to watch a 17-year-old young man die in such a violent manner is deeply disturbing and i have absolutely no doubt that this video will tear at the hearts of all chicagoans. i know that laquan's mother and some family members have

been opposed to the release of this video and i certainly understand their concern and their anguish. as a mother, i cannot imagine the personal pain that laquan's mother and his family have dealt with and will continue to deal with when the video is made public. i hope that the citizens will take this into consideration and show respect and restraint in their actions following the release of this video. before i close and i take questions, i would like to make a comment about mayor eemanuel. the mayor has been criticized for not releasing the video sooner. i will tell you that i believe the mayor's decision to delay the release was in the best interest of allowing federal and state law enforcement officials to conduct our investigations and i thank him for that. finally, let me say that i fully support the rights of our citizens to protest and to express their feelings or their outrage but it must be done without violence or criminal actions. violent actions will not honor the life of laquan and it will do nothing hold this defendant accountable for his actions.

REPORTER: help people understand, why is it so complex and some people just don't -- can't get, can't understand why it takes this long and seems so obvious in a situation like this.

ALVAREZ: you know, as i explained, when you're investigating police officer cases, it is not the same as you're investigating a gang member shooting another. it just isn't. there, you know, you have to understand the use of force model. you have to understand how officers are trained. officers do have a right to use reasonable force. they can use deadly force when appropriate. so you have to understand all of that before you look at a case. you simply can't on a case like this make a split-second decision by watching the video one time and determine what occurred. there were countless number of witnesses that were interviewed in this case. physical evidence looked for. looking for videotapes from the businesses surrounding there, there was a lot of work done on this case, absolute lot of work and adds to the year that we have been investigating.

Dear Cabinet Members,

I would like to provide important updates on two police misconduct cases. Many of you may have questions about these cases and the City's response.

First, as you have likely heard, the City will release a video at 9:30 am tomorrow showing a Chicago police officer shooting and killing Laquan McDonald, a 17 year old who was carrying a knife. The incident occurred on October 20, 2014. Within hours of the incident, our Independent Police Review Authority initiated an investigation. Several days later, IPRA sent evidence in the case, including the video, to prosecutors who initiated a criminal investigation. At the same time, the officer was stripped of his police powers and assigned to desk duty. The criminal investigation is being led by Cook County States Attorney Anita Alvarez and U.S. Attorney Zach Fardon, and the City has been cooperating fully. Earlier today the States Attorney charged the officer with first degree murder. Once the charges were filed, the Chicago Police Department suspended the officer without pay.

Last week a court ordered the City to release the dash camera video of the incident by November 25th in response to a FOIA request, and we will comply with that order. Up to this point, the City had declined to release the video so as not to interfere with an active criminal investigation. For example, releasing a video during a pending investigation has the potential to compromise eyewitness testimony because witnesses may adjust their testimony to fit what they or others perceive in the video. Not releasing evidence during an

ongoing criminal investigation is consistent with the longstanding practice of federal, state and local law enforcement authorities.

Please rest assured that we are working hard to reach out to community stakeholders, activists, elected officials, teachers, principals, media and others in advance of the video release. Yesterday the Mayor personally met with many leaders and activists to clarify the facts of this case and seek their assistance in making sure our City reacts peacefully to this horrendous incident.

Second, earlier today Superintendent Garry McCarthy announced his recommendation to terminate Officer Dante Servin for his fatal shooting of Rekia Boyd. On Tuesday, the formal charges justifying the termination will be sent to the Chicago Police Board for review and further action. The Superintendent's full statement about his decision is provided below:

"After considerable deliberation, I have come to the conclusion that Officer Dante Servin showed incredibly poor judgement in his efforts to intervene in a low-level dispute while off-duty," said Superintendent McCarthy. "His actions tragically resulted in the death of an innocent young woman and an unthinkable loss for a Chicago family and community. In the end, CPD has rules that we all must live by. Officer Servin violated those rules and he's going to be held accountable for that."

Please feel free to share this message, including the facts of the case, with your employees as you see fit.



Pfleger Tells Flock to Block Mag Mile On Friday to Protest Laquan McDonald

MAGNIFICENT MILE — One of the city's most outspoken activists is calling for a Black Friday protest on Michigan Avenue in response to the anticipated release of a video showing a police officer shooting teenager Laquan McDonald.

The Rev. Michael Pfleger told his parish at St. Sabina Church in Auburn Gresham to lead the protest during his homily Sunday, drawing on the legacy of "civil disobedience" established during the 1960s Civil Rights Movement.

"If you really want to make a statement: Black Friday is coming up. The number one business day," Pfleger said. "Don't shop on Black Friday and go down to Michigan Avenue and sit down in the street and block the street on Michigan Avenue with civil disobedience peacefully, and say 'business as usual can't go on while our children are dying."

The call for protest came a few days after a judge ruled the city must release dashcam video from last year showing Officer Jason Van Dyke shooting McDonald, a 17-year-old with a knife, 16 times. The video will be released by Wednesday, prompting Mayor Rahm Emanuel and other officials to brace for the subsequent outcry.

Meanwhile, Pfleger is using it as a call for families to "make a statement" on the busiest shopping day of the year, in Chicago's most prominent retail stretch, about police-involved shootings. Another Chicago police officer, Dante Servin, was acquitted of all charges earlier this year in the 2012 shooting death of 22-year-old Rekia Boyd.

"Why is Jason Van Dyke, why is he not fired?" Pfleger said during his homily. "You paid \$5 million in a settlement. if you paid \$5 million in a settlement you must think he's guilty. Fire his butt."

The Sun-Times reported Monday afternoon that Van Dyke will receive criminal charges Tuesday, and the video is expected to be released at 3 p.m. Wednesday. The Cook County State's Attorney's office did not confirm that.

"The state's attorney's office has been engaged in an active and ongoing investigation into the shooting death of Laquan McDonald," a spokeswoman with the Cook County State's Attorney's Office said Monday. "We have been working with our investigative partners at the federal level to conduct a comprehensive investigation."

Pfleger's remarks drew applause throughout the mega South Side church, 1210 W. 78th St., whose audience Sunday included cast and crew of the "Chi-Raq" movie. Filmmaker Spike Lee also addressed the parish Sunday.

Associated Press: Emanuel Meeting Ministers to Discuss Police Shooting Video

Amid concerns about possible unrest, Chicago Mayor Rahm Emanuel invited ministers and community activists to City Hall on Monday to discuss the upcoming release of a video that shows a white police officer fatally shooting a black teenager last year.

Seventeen-year-old Laquan McDonald was shot 16 times. Police have said he refused to drop a knife.

There is growing concern in the community about what could happen when people see the incident for themselves. A judge last week ordered the police department to release the police car dashcam footage by Wednesday.

Two ministers invited to meet with Emanuel said they think the mayor will solicit their help in preventing the kind of unrest seen in Baltimore and <u>Ferguson</u>, <u>Missouri</u>, after the killings of young black men by police in those cities.

"We are assuming he is going to ask us to call for calm," the Rev. Marshall Hatch said.

Emanuel's office characterized the meeting as something "we regularly do on important topics." But Hatch and the Rev. Ira Acree said it is a rare occurrence and shows the mayor is concerned there might be violence.

"We have been trying to meet with the mayor since the beginning of the year to talk about community relations and his staff asks for a letter and says 'We'll get back to you,' but they never do," Acree said.

Hatch said: "This has the feeling of them scrambling."

The shooting occurred on Oct. 20, 2014, as police responded to a 911 call of a man carrying a knife. Lawyers for McDonald's family who have seen the video say it shows the teen with a small knife and walking away from officers. They say Officer Jason Van Dyke opens fire from about 15 feet and keeps shooting after the teen falls.

Emanuel's meeting with ministers and activists comes as residents brace both for the video's release and for word on whether Van Dyke will face criminal charges. The FBI and the Cook County State's Attorney's Office are investigating the shooting, and an announcement on state or federal charges could come as soon as this week.

Acree and Hatch said blacks in the city are upset about the shooting and because city officials and the Police Department refused for several months to release the video until ordered to do so by a judge. They said people also are angry because the officer, though stripped of his police powers, has been assigned to desk duty and not fired.

"They had the opportunity to be a good example and a model across the country on how to improve police and community relations and they missed it," Acree said.

The Police Department has said it refused to release the video out of concern that doing so would hamper the federal and state investigations. The department said placing an officer on desk duty after a shooting is standard procedure and that it is prohibited from doing anything more during the investigations.







AA: They have not completed their review. No I don't believe they are hanging me out to dry. I felt that with the release of this video that in the interest of public safety that is important this officer is held accountable.

Jay: This video didn't change from a year ago, witnesses didn't change from a year ago. Do you think people buy your explanation?

AA: Yes, this is the truth, Jay. Sometimes things take longer, esp. on the federal level, you've been covering these courts for years, Jay.

Paris: Are you 100 percent rocksolid in these charges?

AA: Coming up on a year—not quite a year—on this joint investigation. I am very confident with charges ive just charged. Im confident that we have the evidence to do it.

Question: Why did judge rule to release by tomorrow?

AA: Public demanding to see video went into Judge Valderrama decision to release video

Question: Did system fail? Should officer have been fired?

AA: Can't comment on that-don't know his prior incidents. I'm bringing charges based on what I feel is appropriate

Question: Was there anyone who was a holdout in bringing the charges? Was it he case that interviews weren't done quickly?

AA: Interviews were done within this past year. Up until a week ago, still interviewing people. Thorough investigation.

Question: Do you think the delay in charges contributes to distrust of law enforcement?

Good afternoon. As you know we have charged JVD with 1st degree murder in the shooting death of LM.

He was 17 when he was shot by defendant. I am going to summarize facts as we proffered them.

On Monday, Oct 20, 2014 – defendant was working on duty with partner in marked patrol car, doing overnight shift.

Circumstances began at 9:47pm when a dispatch radioed a patrol car that individual was breaking windows and stealing car radios from a parking lot.

Dispatch asked if any units had taser – responding officers did not indicate.

At 9:56pm one of the beat cars radioed that suspect had slashed tires. Responding unit with JVD responded. A total of 8 police officers arrived on the scene in 4 vehicles to assist officers. None had tasers.

Video was captured, but no audio. Only one unit captured the video.

Prosecutors obtained video from a local business – but a second was unsuccessful. A third business video was low quality.

Video shows LM going south.

Officer then opened fire on LM. He spun around and fell to ground.

While LM was falling, JVD stepped towards him. The video captures two puffs of smoke coming from ground near his body. They were identified as clouds of debris from the shots.

JVD's partner recovered 16 casings.

JVD was on the scene 30 seconds before he started shooting.

He started shooting 6 seconds after getting out of his video.

14 seconds passed between first and final shot. For 13 of those seconds LM was on the ground.

Of the 8 officers on the scene – only JVD fired.

According to officers, LM never spoke to officers and responded to their commands. One responding said they didn't see the need for force. Several civilians also saw the shooting. The motorist described him as looking for a way to get away from police.

Based on this, and other evidence, shooting when not necessary – not justified and not appropriate use of force – I am charging with murder.

We received a copy of the video on Nov 4, 2014. We immediately opened an investigation. On Nov 10, 2014 we were contacted by the FBI. We provided a video. I have met with the special agent in charge and Fardon, in Dec 2014. We have been engaged in an active joint investigation at both levels. While 12 months seems like it took too long, investigations like this are complex and carry unique legal issues that must be considered. For example:

U.S. Supreme Court has ruled officers can use deadly force. Garrity case says when we can and cannot speak to police officers. We go through great lengths to make sure ASAs handle things the right way. We make sure only certain people can read these statements. We were meticulous. Made sure we would not jeopardize the case – and cause it to be dismissed. That's why this investigation, and all police investigations take significant time. Not unusual to take 20 months to reach a charge. At the end of the day I would rather take my time and get it right – not rush and do it wrong.

We wanted to announced with the feds. But – after the judge ruled last week – I felt compelled to announce these state charges without the US attorney. This is a full measure of justice.

The ruling to release the video – moved our timing up, but did not change it. I made the decision to charge weeks ago. I have seen it a number of times and it is graphic, violent, chilling. I have done this for 30 years – I have seen the most graphic things. To watch this is disturbing, and I have no doubt this video will tear at the hearts of all Chicagoans. I understand the concern and anguish of the family.

I hope the citizens take this into consideration in their actions.

I want to comment about Mayor Emanuel – I have seen reports he has been criticized for not releasing the video.

His decision was in the best interest of law enforcement and I think him for that.

First, please know that this video will not be shown in our schools. Even so, we know that many students will likely be discussing it and may be upset by its violent content. To make sure that children have a safe outlet for their questions and emotions, we have created a special toolkit that will help teachers talk to students about this incident in a sensitive and constructive way. The toolkit suggests the students continue the conversation at home, sharing what they've learned with their parents and having an open dialogue.

In addition to the steps we are taking in the classroom, our school counselors are always available to speak with students who may need additional support. When

you are talking with your children about this situation, please encourage them to reach out to their counselors for help at any time.

We appreciate you partnering with us as we work to help our students process this difficult turn of events. If you have any questions about how this situation will be handled in your child's school, please contact your principal directly.

Good afternoon - The following information is being provided as an officer safety alert, Please disseminate appropriately to your agency personnel. Be safe. Courtenae On 11/24/2015, an FBI source, who has reported reliable intelligence in the past, provided the following information: CHS was questioned with regard to the possibility for violence in the City of Chicago and surrounding suburbs after the release of the Laguan McDonald video, CHS advised that violent rhetoric is high. Due to the recent media spotlight on officer-involved deaths of minorities, there is a lot of anger in neighborhoods served by the Chicago Police Department. CHS believes that the possibility of an officer being targeted by gang members is extremely high. The possibility of rioting is high, given the propensity for violence to occur due to anti-police sentiments in many neighborhoods on the west side of Chicago. CHS has heard specific threats from street gang members in the area of Augusta and Sacramento to Augusta and Western. In addition to these locations. These threats have named the uniformed patrol officers of the Chicago Police Department as targets. CHS believes the two primary locations of concern to be the 14th District Police Station and the Homan Square building. With regard to both locations, CHS has heard discussions of gang members "setting up" and waiting for police employees to exit the buildings to walk to their cars. CHS knows these employees are typically getting off shift and may not have their protective equipment, such as bullet-resistant vests and weapons, with them. In addition to being unarmed or unprotected, these employees will likely be in either small groups or by themselves, which would make them targets of opportunity. CHS states that shooters may lay in wait for police officers, and then conduct an ambush. In addition to ambushing police officers at the police stations, CHS states another tactic discussed is to lay in wait for police vehicles to drive down one-way streets with dead ends. After the marked unit has entered the block, one group of shooters will fire rounds into the air from a hidden location, in order to bring the moving vehicle to a halt. After the vehicle has halted, another group of shooters closer to the stopped

police unit will then open fire upon the stopped unit, with the goal of killing any police officers inside the vehicle. CHS has heard a lot of rhetoric lately that many people believe police officers will murder innocent civilians. Some believe the only way to end police brutality is to murder police officers in retaliation. In addition to conducting murder, CHS believes severe property damage will occur if riots are allowed to develop. CHS advises all uniformed police officers, and police employees entering/exiting police buildings are targets of opportunity which will be exploited by shooters if they are given the advantage.

Pfleger Tells Flock to Block Mag Mile On Friday to Protest Laquan McDonald

DNAInfo

MAGNIFICENT MILE — One of the city's most outspoken activists is calling for a Black Friday protest on Michigan Avenue in response to the anticipated release of a video showing a police officer shooting teenager Laquan McDonald.

The Rev. Michael Pfleger told his parish at St. Sabina Church in Auburn Gresham to lead the protest during his homily Sunday, drawing on the legacy of "civil disobedience" established during the 1960s Civil Rights Movement.

"If you really want to make a statement: Black Friday is coming up. The number one business day," Pfleger said. "Don't shop on Black Friday and go down to Michigan Avenue and sit down in the street and block the street on Michigan Avenue with civil disobedience peacefully, and say 'business as usual can't go on while our children are dying."

The call for protest came a few days after a judge ruled the city must release dashcam video from last year showing Officer Jason Van Dyke shooting McDonald, a 17-year-old with a knife, 16 times. The video will be released by Wednesday, prompting Mayor Rahm Emanuel and other officials to brace for the subsequent outcry.

Meanwhile, Pfleger is using it as a call for families to "make a statement" on the busiest shopping day of the year, in Chicago's most prominent retail stretch, about police-involved shootings. Another Chicago police officer, Dante Servin, was acquitted of all charges earlier this year in the 2012 shooting death of 22-year-old Rekia Boyd.

"Why is Jason Van Dyke, why is he not fired?" Pfleger said during his homily. "You paid \$5 million in a settlement. if you paid \$5 million in a settlement you must think he's guilty. Fire his butt."

The Sun-Times reported Monday afternoon that Van Dyke will receive criminal charges Tuesday, and the video is expected to be released at 3 p.m. Wednesday. The Cook County State's Attorney's office did not confirm that.

"The state's attorney's office has been engaged in an active and ongoing investigation into the shooting death of Laquan McDonald," a spokeswoman with the Cook County State's Attorney's Office said Monday. "We have been working with our investigative partners at the federal level to conduct a comprehensive investigation."

Pfleger's remarks drew applause throughout the mega South Side church, 1210 W. 78th St., whose audience Sunday included cast and crew of the "Chi-Raq" movie. Filmmaker Spike Lee also addressed the parish Sunday.

Associated Press: Emanuel Meeting Ministers to Discuss Police Shooting Video

Amid concerns about possible unrest, Chicago Mayor <u>Rahm Emanuel</u> invited ministers and community activists to City Hall on Monday to discuss the upcoming release of a video that shows a white police officer fatally shooting a black teenager last year.

Seventeen-year-old Laquan McDonald was shot 16 times. Police have said he refused to drop a knife.

There is growing concern in the community about what could happen when people see the incident for themselves. A judge last week ordered the police department to release the police car dashcam footage by Wednesday.

Two ministers invited to meet with Emanuel said they think the mayor will solicit their help in preventing the kind of unrest seen in Baltimore and <u>Ferguson</u>, <u>Missouri</u>, after the killings of young black men by police in those cities.

"We are assuming he is going to ask us to call for calm," the Rev. Marshall Hatch said.

Emanuel's office characterized the meeting as something "we regularly do on important topics." But Hatch and the Rev. Ira Acree said it is a rare occurrence and shows the mayor is concerned there might be violence.

"We have been trying to meet with the mayor since the beginning of the year to talk about community relations and his staff asks for a letter and says 'We'll get back to you,' but they never do," Acree said.

Hatch said: "This has the feeling of them scrambling."

The shooting occurred on Oct. 20, 2014, as police responded to a 911 call of a man carrying a knife. Lawyers for McDonald's family who have seen the video say it shows the teen with a small knife and walking away from officers. They say Officer Jason Van Dyke opens fire from about 15 feet and keeps shooting after the teen falls.

Emanuel's meeting with ministers and activists comes as residents brace both for the video's release and for word on whether Van Dyke will face criminal charges. The FBI and the Cook County State's Attorney's Office are investigating the shooting, and an announcement on state or federal charges could come as soon as this week.

Acree and Hatch said blacks in the city are upset about the shooting and because city officials and the Police Department refused for several months to release the video until ordered to do so by a judge. They said people also are angry because the officer, though stripped of his police powers, has been assigned to desk duty and not fired.

"They had the opportunity to be a good example and a model across the country on how to improve police and community relations and they missed it," Acree said.

The Police Department has said it refused to release the video out of concern that doing so would hamper the federal and state investigations. The department said placing an officer on desk duty after a shooting is standard procedure and that it is prohibited from doing anything more during the investigations.

Officer Charged Suspended Without Pay

Earlier today, Cook County State's Attorney Anita Alvarez filed first degree murder charges against police officer Jason Van Dyke in the October 2014 shooting of 17-year-old Laquan McDonald. The charges provide the Police Department (CPD) with its first opportunity to suspend Van Dyke without pay, an action that was promptly taken this afternoon.

Additionally, CPD is releasing dash-cam video of the shooting, which keeps with the City's commitment to release the video once the criminal investigation is complete and in accordance with a judge's ruling that the video be released by Wednesday.

The video will be available via download at http://video11242015.azurewebsites.net/ today from 5:00PM to 7:00PM. The password required to download the video can be obtained from CPD News Affairs.

Below is a brief history of key events surrounding the shooting and the subsequent investigation.

• On October 20, 2014 at 41st and Pulaski, Van Dyke shot and killed Laquan McDonald, who was wielding a knife.

- The Independent Police Review Authority (IPRA), a civilian independent agency, is charged with investigating all officer-involved shootings. IPRA opened its investigation into this incident within hours of the shooting. Between October 20 and October 28, 2014, IPRA interviewed witnesses and collected evidence.
- For every officer-involved shooting, IPRA sends the evidence to the Cook County State's Attorney so that state prosecutors can determine whether to pursue a criminal investigation. On October 29, 2014, IPRA sent the evidence in this case, including the dash camera video, to the Cook County State's Attorney's Office. The evidence was also later shared with the FBI and the Office of the U.S. Attorney as prosecutors initiated state and federal criminal investigation. Per standard practice, IPRA was then required to suspend its administrative investigation so as not to interfere with the criminal investigation.
- On October 29, 2014, the officer was stripped of his police powers and placed on desk duty.
- On November 24, 2015, Cook County State's Attorney Anita Alvarez charged Van Dyke with first degree murder.
- IPRA will now resume its administrative investigation.

Pfleger Tells Flock to Block Mag Mile On Friday to Protest Laquan McDonald

MAGNIFICENT MILE — One of the city's most outspoken activists is calling for a Black Friday protest on Michigan Avenue in response to the <u>anticipated release</u> of a video showing a police officer shooting teenager Laquan McDonald.

The Rev. Michael Pfleger told his parish at St. Sabina Church in Auburn Gresham to lead the protest during his homily Sunday, drawing on the legacy of "civil disobedience" established during the 1960s Civil Rights Movement.

"If you really want to make a statement: Black Friday is coming up. The number one business day," Pfleger said. "Don't shop on Black Friday and go down to Michigan Avenue and sit down in the street and block the street on Michigan Avenue with civil disobedience peacefully, and say 'business as usual can't go on while our children are dying."

The call for protest came a few days after a judge ruled the city must release dashcam video from last year showing Officer Jason Van Dyke shooting McDonald, a 17-year-old with a knife, 16 times. The <u>video will be released by Wednesday</u>, prompting Mayor Rahm Emanuel and other officials to brace for the subsequent outcry.

Meanwhile, Pfleger is using it as a call for families to "make a statement" on the busiest shopping day of the year, in Chicago's most prominent retail stretch, about police-involved shootings. Another Chicago police officer, Dante Servin, was <u>acquitted of all charges</u> earlier this year in the 2012 shooting death of 22-year-old Rekia Boyd.

"Why is Jason Van Dyke, why is he not fired?" Pfleger said during his homily. "You paid \$5 million in a settlement. if you paid \$5 million in a settlement you must think he's guilty. Fire his butt."

The <u>Sun-Times</u> reported Monday afternoon that Van Dyke will receive criminal charges Tuesday, and the video is expected to be released at 3 p.m. Wednesday. The Cook County State's Attorney's office did not confirm that. "The state's attorney's office has been engaged in an active and ongoing investigation into the shooting death of Laquan McDonald," a spokeswoman with the Cook County State's Attorney's Office said Monday. "We have been working with our investigative partners at the federal level to conduct a comprehensive investigation." Pfleger's remarks drew applause throughout the mega South Side church, 1210 W. 78th St., whose audience Sunday included cast and crew of the "<u>Chi-Raq</u>" movie. Filmmaker Spike Lee also addressed the parish Sunday.

Associated Press: Emanuel Meeting Ministers to Discuss Police Shooting Video

Amid concerns about possible unrest, Chicago Mayor Rahm Emanuel invited ministers and community activists to City Hall on Monday to discuss the upcoming release of a video that shows a white police officer fatally shooting a black teenager last year.

Seventeen-year-old Laquan McDonald was shot 16 times. Police have said he refused to drop a knife.

There is growing concern in the community about what could happen when people see the incident for themselves. A judge last week ordered the police department to release the police car dashcam footage by Wednesday.

Two ministers invited to meet with Emanuel said they think the mayor will solicit their help in preventing the kind of unrest seen in Baltimore and <u>Ferguson</u>, <u>Missouri</u>, after the killings of young black men by police in those cities.

"We are assuming he is going to ask us to call for calm," the Rev. Marshall Hatch said.

Emanuel's office characterized the meeting as something "we regularly do on important topics." But Hatch and the Rev. Ira Acree said it is a rare occurrence and shows the mayor is concerned there might be violence.

"We have been trying to meet with the mayor since the beginning of the year to talk about community relations and his staff asks for a letter and says 'We'll get back to you,' but they never do," Acree said.

Hatch said: "This has the feeling of them scrambling."

The shooting occurred on Oct. 20, 2014, as police responded to a 911 call of a man carrying a knife. Lawyers for McDonald's family who have seen the video say it shows the teen with a small knife and walking away from officers. They say Officer Jason Van Dyke opens fire from about 15 feet and keeps shooting after the teen falls.

Emanuel's meeting with ministers and activists comes as residents brace both for the video's release and for word on whether Van Dyke will face criminal charges. The FBI and the Cook County State's Attorney's Office are investigating the shooting, and an announcement on state or federal charges could come as soon as this week.

Acree and Hatch said blacks in the city are upset about the shooting and because city officials and the Police Department refused for several months to release the video until ordered to do so by a judge. They said people also are angry because the officer, though stripped of his police powers, has been assigned to desk duty and not fired.

"They had the opportunity to be a good example and a model across the country on how to improve police and community relations and they missed it," Acree said.

The Police Department has said it refused to release the video out of concern that doing so would hamper the federal and state investigations. The department said placing an officer on desk duty after a shooting is standard procedure and that it is prohibited from doing anything more during the investigations.

Officer Charged Suspended Without Pay

Earlier today, Cook County State's Attorney Anita Alvarez filed first degree murder charges against police officer Jason Van Dyke in the October 2014 shooting of 17-year-old Laquan McDonald. The charges provide the Police Department (CPD) with its first opportunity to suspend Van Dyke without pay, an action that was promptly taken this afternoon.

Additionally, CPD is releasing dash-cam video of the shooting, which keeps with the City's commitment to release the video in accordance with a judge's ruling that the video be released by Wednesday.

"Across Chicago there are thousands of police officers who protect our communities every day with the highest professional standards. As the State's Attorney made clear, Jason Van Dyke's actions violated those standards and also the moral standards that bind our community together. Rather than uphold the law, he took the law into his own hands and it's now up to the justice system to hold him accountable. But his actions are in no way a reflection of the dedication and professionalism that our police officers exemplify every day and that our residents expect throughout our city."

"Police officers are given a tremendous amount of authority to protect our communities, and it is incumbent on every officer to display their best judgment when exercising that authority," said Superintendent Garry McCarthy. "Thousands of officers do so every day, but there must also be accountability for those who don't. Because of the authority we are entrusted with, any time a life is lost at the hand of a police officer, the incident requires serious scrutiny and review. Officer Van Dyke's actions were wrong. Because of that a life was lost, and he will have to account for his actions."

Per standard practice, IPRA then suspended its administrative investigation so as not to interfere with the criminal investigation.
- On October 30, 2014, the officer was stripped of his police powers and placed on desk duty.
- On November 24, 2015, Cook County State's Attorney Anita Alvarez charged Van Dyke with first degree murder. Chicago Police Department then immediately suspended him without pay.

- A: The Independent Police Review Authority is responsible for investigating all police-involved shooting incidents. When a criminal investigation emerges from the same incident, IPRA's investigation is placed on hold until the criminal investigation is complete. Once IPRA resumes its investigation, it may recommend an officer be terminated. At that point the Superintendent has 60 days to review the recommendation, and if he agrees, charges are filed with the Police Board. The Police Board will then hold a hearing and make a final determination.

"Across Chicago there are thousands of police officers who protect our communities every day with the highest professional standards. As the State's Attorney made clear, Jason Van Dyke's actions violated those standards and also the moral standards that bind our community together. Rather than uphold the law, he took the law into his own hands and it's now up to the justice system to hold him accountable. But his actions are in no way a reflection of the dedication and professionalism that our police officers exemplify every day and that our residents expect throughout our city."

"Police officers are given a tremendous amount of authority to protect our communities, and it is incumbent on every officer to display their best judgment when exercising that authority," said Superintendent Garry McCarthy. "Thousands of officers do so every day, but there must also be accountability for those who don't. Because of the authority we are entrusted with, any time a life is lost at the hand of a police officer, the incident requires serious scrutiny and review. Officer Van Dyke's actions were wrong. Because of that a life was lost, and he will have to account for his actions."

Pfleger Tells Flock to Block Mag Mile On Friday to Protest Laquan McDonald

MAGNIFICENT MILE — One of the city's most outspoken activists is calling for a Black Friday protest on Michigan Avenue in response to the <u>anticipated release</u> of a video showing a police officer shooting teenager Laquan McDonald.

The Rev. Michael Pfleger told his parish at St. Sabina Church in Auburn Gresham to lead the protest during his homily Sunday, drawing on the legacy of "civil disobedience" established during the 1960s Civil Rights Movement.

"If you really want to make a statement: Black Friday is coming up. The number one business day," Pfleger said. "Don't shop on Black Friday and go down to Michigan Avenue and sit down in the street and block the street on Michigan Avenue with civil disobedience peacefully, and say 'business as usual can't go on while our children are dying."

The call for protest came a few days after a judge ruled the city must release dashcam video from last year showing Officer Jason Van Dyke shooting McDonald, a 17-year-old with a knife, 16 times. The <u>video will be released by Wednesday</u>, prompting Mayor Rahm Emanuel and other officials to brace for the subsequent outcry.

Meanwhile, Pfleger is using it as a call for families to "make a statement" on the busiest shopping day of the year, in Chicago's most prominent retail stretch, about police-involved shootings. Another Chicago police officer, Dante Servin, was <u>acquitted of all charges</u> earlier this year in the 2012 shooting death of 22-year-old Rekia Boyd.

"Why is Jason Van Dyke, why is he not fired?" Pfleger said during his homily. "You paid \$5 million in a settlement. if you paid \$5 million in a settlement you must think he's guilty. Fire his butt."

The <u>Sun-Times</u> reported Monday afternoon that Van Dyke will receive criminal charges Tuesday, and the video is expected to be released at 3 p.m. Wednesday. The Cook County State's Attorney's office did not confirm that. "The state's attorney's office has been engaged in an active and ongoing investigation into the shooting death of Laquan McDonald," a spokeswoman with the Cook County State's Attorney's Office said Monday. "We have been working with our investigative partners at the federal level to conduct a comprehensive investigation." Pfleger's remarks drew applause throughout the mega South Side church, 1210 W. 78th St., whose audience Sunday included cast and crew of the "<u>Chi-Raq</u>" movie. Filmmaker Spike Lee also addressed the parish Sunday.

Associated Press: Emanuel Meeting Ministers to Discuss Police Shooting Video

Amid concerns about possible unrest, Chicago Mayor Rahm Emanuel invited ministers and community activists to City Hall on Monday to discuss the upcoming release of a video that shows a white police officer fatally shooting a black teenager last year.

Seventeen-year-old Laquan McDonald was shot 16 times. Police have said he refused to drop a knife.

There is growing concern in the community about what could happen when people see the incident for themselves. A judge last week ordered the police department to release the police car dashcam footage by Wednesday.

Two ministers invited to meet with Emanuel said they think the mayor will solicit their help in preventing the kind of unrest seen in Baltimore and <u>Ferguson</u>, <u>Missouri</u>, after the killings of young black men by police in those cities.

"We are assuming he is going to ask us to call for calm," the Rev. Marshall Hatch said.

Emanuel's office characterized the meeting as something "we regularly do on important topics." But Hatch and the Rev. Ira Acree said it is a rare occurrence and shows the mayor is concerned there might be violence.

"We have been trying to meet with the mayor since the beginning of the year to talk about community relations and his staff asks for a letter and says 'We'll get back to you,' but they never do," Acree said.

Hatch said: "This has the feeling of them scrambling."

The shooting occurred on Oct. 20, 2014, as police responded to a 911 call of a man carrying a knife. Lawyers for McDonald's family who have seen the video say it shows the teen with a small knife and walking away from officers. They say Officer Jason Van Dyke opens fire from about 15 feet and keeps shooting after the teen falls.

Emanuel's meeting with ministers and activists comes as residents brace both for the video's release and for word on whether Van Dyke will face criminal charges. The FBI and the Cook County State's Attorney's Office are investigating the shooting, and an announcement on state or federal charges could come as soon as this week.

Acree and Hatch said blacks in the city are upset about the shooting and because city officials and the Police Department refused for several months to release the video until ordered to do so by a judge. They said people also are angry because the officer, though stripped of his police powers, has been assigned to desk duty and not fired.

"They had the opportunity to be a good example and a model across the country on how to improve police and community relations and they missed it," Acree said.

The Police Department has said it refused to release the video out of concern that doing so would hamper the federal and state investigations. The department said placing an officer on desk duty after a shooting is standard procedure and that it is prohibited from doing anything more during the investigations.

Officer Charged Suspended Without Pay

Earlier today, Cook County State's Attorney Anita Alvarez filed first degree murder charges against police officer Jason Van Dyke in the October 2014 shooting of 17-year-old Laquan McDonald. The charges provide the Police Department (CPD) with its first opportunity to suspend Van Dyke without pay, an action that was promptly taken this afternoon.

Additionally, CPD is releasing dash-cam video of the shooting, which keeps with the City's commitment to release the video in accordance with a judge's ruling that the video be released by Wednesday.

The video will be available via download at http://video11242015.azurewebsites.net/ today from 5:00PM to 7:00PM. The password required to download the video can be obtained from CPD News Affairs.

Fact Sheet Regarding the Shooting of Laquan McDonald

Brief Facts and Timeline for the Incident and Investigation

- The Independent Police Review Authority (IPRA), a civilian independent agency, is charged with investigating all officer-involved shootings. IPRA opened its investigation into this incident within hours of the shooting. Between Oct. 20 and Oct. 28, IPRA interviewed witnesses and collected evidence. On Oct. 29, the officer was stripped of his police powers.
- For every officer-involved shooting, IPRA sends the evidence to the Cook County State's Attorney so that state prosecutors can determine whether to pursue a criminal investigation. Several days after the incident, IPRA sent the evidence in this case, including the dash camera video, to the Cook County States Attorney's Office. The evidence was also later shared with the FBI and the Office of the U.S. Attorney as prosecutors initiated state and federal criminal investigation. Per standard practice, IPRA then suspended its administrative investigation so as not to interfere with the criminal investigation.
- On November 24, 2015, the Cook County States Attorney Anita Alvarez charged officer Van Dyke with first degree murder.
- That same day, the Chicago Police Department suspended him without pay.
- Once the criminal case has concluded, IPRA will resume and finish its administrative investigation.

Q&A

Q: Why wouldn't the city release the video?

A: The video is evidence in an active criminal investigation and a grand jury has been convened to determine whether criminal charges should be brought. We did not want to do anything that might interfere with the ongoing investigation. For example, releasing a video during a pending investigation has the potential to compromise eyewitness testimony because witnesses may adjust their testimony to fit what they or others perceive in the video. Not releasing evidence during an ongoing criminal investigation is consistent with the longstanding practice of federal, state and local law enforcement authorities. As we stated months ago, the City planned to release the video once the investigation had concluded.

Q: What is the status of IPRA's investigation into this incident?

A: IPRA started its investigation immediately after the shooting. After collecting evidence and interviewing witnesses, IPRA sent the evidence to state and federal prosecutors who initiated a

criminal investigation. Once the criminal investigation started, per standard practice, IPRA had to suspend its investigation so as not to interfere with the criminal proceedings.

- Q: Why was the Chicago Police Department able to suspend this officer without pay?
- A: The Chicago Police Department requires that officers be able to lawfully carry a firearm as a condition of their employment. After the Cook County State's Attorney charged Officer Van Dyke with first degree murder, the States Attorney revoked his Firearm Owner ID Card, making it clear that he can no longer lawfully carry a firearm. The officer was immediately suspended without pay.
- Q: When an officer is not currently facing criminal charges, as is true for Officer Dante Servin, what is the process for terminating that officer's employment?
- A: The Independent Police Review Authority is responsible for investigating all police-involved shooting incidents. When a criminal investigation emerges from the same incident, IPRA's investigation is placed on hold until the criminal investigation is complete. Once IPRA resumes its investigation, it may recommend an officer be terminated. At that point the Superintendent has 60 days to review the recommendation, and if he agrees, charges are filed with the Police Board. The Police Board will then hold a hearing and make a final determination.

CHICAGO POLICE DEPARTMENT RELEASES DASH-CAM VIDEO IN SHOOTING OF LAQUAN MCDONALD

Officer Charged Suspended Without Pay

Earlier today, Cook County State's Attorney Anita Alvarez filed first degree murder charges against police officer Jason Van Dyke in the October 2014 shooting of 17-year-old Laquan McDonald. The charges provide the Police Department (CPD) with its first opportunity to suspend Van Dyke without pay, an action that was promptly taken this afternoon.

Additionally, CPD is releasing dash-cam video of the shooting, which keeps with the City's commitment to release the video in accordance with a judge's ruling that the video be released by Wednesday.

The video will be available via download at http://video11242015.azurewebsites.net/ today from 5:00PM to 7:00PM. The password required to download the video can be obtained from CPD News Affairs.

"Across Chicago there are thousands of police officers who protect our communities every day with the highest professional standards. As the State's Attorney made clear, Jason Van Dyke's actions violated those standards and also the moral standards that bind our community together. Rather than uphold the law, he took the law into his own hands and it's now up to the justice system to hold him accountable. But his actions are in no way a reflection of the dedication and professionalism that our police officers exemplify every day and that our residents expect throughout our city."

"Police officers are given a tremendous amount of authority to protect our communities, and it is incumbent on every officer to display their best judgment when exercising that authority," said Superintendent Garry McCarthy. "Thousands of officers do so every day, but there must also be accountability for those who don't. Because of the authority we are entrusted with, any time a life is lost at the hand of a police officer, the incident requires serious scrutiny and review. Officer Van Dyke's actions were wrong. Because of that a life was lost, and he will have to account for his actions."

Below is a brief history of key events surrounding the shooting and the subsequent investigation.

- On October 20, 2014 at 41st and Pulaski, Van Dyke shot and killed Laquan McDonald, who was carrying a knife.
- The Independent Police Review Authority (IPRA), a civilian independent agency, is charged with investigating all officer-involved shootings. IPRA opened its investigation into this incident within hours of the shooting. Between October 20 and October 28, 2014, IPRA interviewed witnesses and collected evidence.
- For every officer-involved shooting, IPRA sends the evidence to the Cook County State's Attorney so that state prosecutors can determine whether to pursue a criminal investigation. On October 29, 2014, IPRA sent the evidence in this case to the Cook County State's Attorney's Office. The evidence was also later shared with the FBI and the Office of the U.S. Attorney as prosecutors initiated state and federal criminal investigations. Per standard practice, IPRA then suspended its administrative investigation so as not to interfere with the criminal investigation.
- On October 30, 2014, the officer was stripped of his police powers and placed on desk duty.
- On November 24, 2015, Cook County State's Attorney Anita Alvarez charged Van Dyke with first degree murder. Chicago Police Department then immediately suspended him without pay.

Fact Sheet Regarding the Shooting of Laquan McDonald

Brief Facts and Timeline for the Incident and Investigation

- On October 20, 2014 at 41st and Pulaski, a Chicago police officer shot and killed a juvenile, Laquan McDonald, who was carrying a knife.
- The Independent Police Review Authority (IPRA), a civilian independent agency, is charged with investigating all officer-involved shootings. IPRA opened its investigation into this incident within hours of the shooting. Between Oct. 20 and Oct. 28, IPRA interviewed witnesses and collected evidence. On Oct. 29, the officer was stripped of his police powers.
- For every officer-involved shooting, IPRA sends the evidence to the Cook County State's Attorney so that state prosecutors can determine whether to pursue a criminal investigation. Several days after the incident, IPRA sent the evidence in this case, including the dash camera video, to the Cook County States Attorney's Office. The evidence was also later shared with the FBI and the Office of the U.S. Attorney as prosecutors initiated state and federal criminal investigation. Per standard practice, IPRA then suspended its administrative investigation so as not to interfere with the criminal investigation.
- On November 24, 2015, the Cook County States Attorney Anita Alvarez charged officer Van Dyke with first degree murder.
- That same day, the Chicago Police Department suspended him without pay.
- Once the criminal case has concluded, IPRA will resume and finish its administrative investigation.

Q&A

Q: Why wouldn't the city release the video?

A: The video is evidence in an active criminal investigation and a grand jury has been convened to determine whether criminal charges should be brought. We did not want to do anything that might interfere with the ongoing investigation. For example, releasing a video during a pending investigation has the potential to compromise eyewitness testimony because witnesses may adjust their testimony to fit what they or others perceive in the video. Not releasing evidence during an ongoing criminal investigation is consistent with the longstanding practice of federal, state and local law enforcement authorities. As we stated months ago, the City planned to release the video once the investigation had concluded.

Q: What is the status of IPRA's investigation into this incident?

A: IPRA started its investigation immediately after the shooting. After collecting evidence and interviewing witnesses, IPRA sent the evidence to state and federal prosecutors who initiated a

criminal investigation. Once the criminal investigation started, per standard practice, IPRA had to suspend its investigation so as not to interfere with the criminal proceedings.

- Q: Why was the Chicago Police Department able to suspend this officer without pay?
- A: The Chicago Police Department requires that officers be able to lawfully carry a firearm as a condition of their employment. After the Cook County State's Attorney charged Officer Van Dyke with first degree murder, the States Attorney revoked his Firearm Owner ID Card, making it clear that he can no longer lawfully carry a firearm. The officer was immediately suspended without pay.
- Q: When an officer is not currently facing criminal charges, as is true for Officer Dante Servin, what is the process for terminating that officer's employment?
- A: The Independent Police Review Authority is responsible for investigating all police-involved shooting incidents. When a criminal investigation emerges from the same incident, IPRA's investigation is placed on hold until the criminal investigation is complete. Once IPRA resumes its investigation, it may recommend an officer be terminated. At that point the Superintendent has 60 days to review the recommendation, and if he agrees, charges are filed with the Police Board. The Police Board will then hold a hearing and make a final determination.

AP: Businesses advise tenants to prepare for protests

Mayor Rahm Emanuel and Police Superintendent Garry McCarthy also are calling for calm, as are McDonald's parents.



Pfleger Tells Flock to Block Mag Mile On Friday to Protest Laquan McDonald

MAGNIFICENT MILE — One of the city's most outspoken activists is calling for a Black Friday protest on Michigan Avenue in response to the <u>anticipated release</u> of a video showing a police officer shooting teenager Laquan McDonald.

The Rev. Michael Pfleger told his parish at St. Sabina Church in Auburn Gresham to lead the protest during his homily Sunday, drawing on the legacy of "civil disobedience" established during the 1960s Civil Rights Movement.

"If you really want to make a statement: Black Friday is coming up. The number one business day," Pfleger said. "Don't shop on Black Friday and go down to Michigan Avenue and sit down in the street and block the street on Michigan Avenue with civil disobedience peacefully, and say 'business as usual can't go on while our children are dying."

The call for protest came a few days after a judge ruled the city must release dashcam video from last year showing Officer Jason Van Dyke shooting McDonald, a 17-year-old with a knife, 16 times. The <u>video will be released by Wednesday</u>, prompting Mayor Rahm Emanuel and other officials to brace for the subsequent outcry.

Meanwhile, Pfleger is using it as a call for families to "make a statement" on the busiest shopping day of the year, in Chicago's most prominent retail stretch, about police-involved shootings. Another Chicago police officer, Dante Servin, was <u>acquitted of all charges</u> earlier this year in the 2012 shooting death of 22-year-old Rekia Boyd.

"Why is Jason Van Dyke, why is he not fired?" Pfleger said during his homily. "You paid \$5 million in a settlement. if you paid \$5 million in a settlement you must think he's guilty. Fire his butt."

The <u>Sun-Times</u> reported Monday afternoon that Van Dyke will receive criminal charges Tuesday, and the video is expected to be released at 3 p.m. Wednesday. The Cook County State's Attorney's office did not confirm that. "The state's attorney's office has been engaged in an active and ongoing investigation into the shooting death of Laquan McDonald," a spokeswoman with the Cook County State's Attorney's Office said Monday. "We have been working with our investigative partners at the federal level to conduct a comprehensive investigation." Pfleger's remarks drew applause throughout the mega South Side church, 1210 W. 78th St., whose audience Sunday included cast and crew of the "<u>Chi-Raq</u>" movie. Filmmaker Spike Lee also addressed the parish Sunday.

Associated Press: Emanuel Meeting Ministers to Discuss Police Shooting Video

Amid concerns about possible unrest, Chicago Mayor Rahm Emanuel invited ministers and community activists to City Hall on Monday to discuss the upcoming release of a video that shows a white police officer fatally shooting a black teenager last year.

Seventeen-year-old Laquan McDonald was shot 16 times. Police have said he refused to drop a knife.

There is growing concern in the community about what could happen when people see the incident for themselves. A judge last week ordered the police department to release the police car dashcam footage by Wednesday.

Two ministers invited to meet with Emanuel said they think the mayor will solicit their help in preventing the kind of unrest seen in Baltimore and <u>Ferguson</u>, <u>Missouri</u>, after the killings of young black men by police in those cities.

"We are assuming he is going to ask us to call for calm," the Rev. Marshall Hatch said.

Emanuel's office characterized the meeting as something "we regularly do on important topics." But Hatch and the Rev. Ira Acree said it is a rare occurrence and shows the mayor is concerned there might be violence.

"We have been trying to meet with the mayor since the beginning of the year to talk about community relations and his staff asks for a letter and says 'We'll get back to you,' but they never do," Acree said.

Hatch said: "This has the feeling of them scrambling."

The shooting occurred on Oct. 20, 2014, as police responded to a 911 call of a man carrying a knife. Lawyers for McDonald's family who have seen the video say it shows the teen with a small knife and walking away from officers. They say Officer Jason Van Dyke opens fire from about 15 feet and keeps shooting after the teen falls.

Emanuel's meeting with ministers and activists comes as residents brace both for the video's release and for word on whether Van Dyke will face criminal charges. The FBI and the Cook County State's Attorney's Office are investigating the shooting, and an announcement on state or federal charges could come as soon as this week.

Acree and Hatch said blacks in the city are upset about the shooting and because city officials and the Police Department refused for several months to release the video until ordered to do so by a judge. They said people also are angry because the officer, though stripped of his police powers, has been assigned to desk duty and not fired.

"They had the opportunity to be a good example and a model across the country on how to improve police and community relations and they missed it," Acree said.

The Police Department has said it refused to release the video out of concern that doing so would hamper the federal and state investigations. The department said placing an officer on desk duty after a shooting is standard procedure and that it is prohibited from doing anything more during the investigations.

Dear Cabinet Members,

I would like to provide important updates on two police misconduct cases. Many of you may have questions about these cases and the City's response.

First, as you have likely heard, the City will release a video at 9:30 am tomorrow showing a Chicago police officer shooting and killing Laquan McDonald, a 17 year old who was carrying a knife. The incident occurred on October 20, 2014. Within hours of the incident, our Independent Police Review Authority initiated an investigation. Several days later, IPRA sent evidence in the case, including the video, to prosecutors who initiated a criminal investigation. At the same time, the officer was stripped of his police powers and assigned to desk duty. The criminal investigation is being led by Cook County States Attorney Anita Alvarez and U.S.

Attorney Zach Fardon, and the City has been cooperating fully. Earlier today the States Attorney charged the officer with first degree murder. Once the charges were filed, the Chicago Police Department suspended the officer without pay.

Last week a court ordered the City to release the dash camera video of the incident by November 25th in response to a FOIA request, and we will comply with that order. Up to this point, the City had declined to release the video so as not to interfere with an active criminal investigation. For example, releasing a video during a pending investigation has the potential to compromise eyewitness testimony because witnesses may adjust their testimony to fit what they or others perceive in the video. Not releasing evidence during an ongoing criminal investigation is consistent with the longstanding practice of federal, state and local law enforcement authorities.

Please rest assured that we are working hard to reach out to community stakeholders, activists, elected officials, teachers, principals, media and others in advance of the video release. Yesterday the Mayor personally met with many leaders and activists to clarify the facts of this case and seek their assistance in making sure our City reacts peacefully to this horrendous incident.

Second, earlier today Superintendent Garry McCarthy announced his recommendation to terminate Officer Dante Servin for his fatal shooting of Rekia Boyd. On Tuesday, the formal charges justifying the termination will be sent to the Chicago Police Board for review and further action. The Superintendent's full statement about his decision is provided below:

"After considerable deliberation, I have come to the conclusion that Officer Dante Servin showed incredibly poor judgement in his efforts to intervene in a low-level dispute while off-duty," said Superintendent McCarthy. "His actions tragically resulted in the death of an innocent young woman and an unthinkable loss for a Chicago family and community. In the end, CPD has rules that we all must live by. Officer Servin violated those rules and he's going to be held accountable for that."

I have also attached the Mayor's full statement regarding this decision.

Please feel free to share this message, including the facts of the case, with your employees as you see fit.

Police Officer Jason Van Dyke went to the criminal court in Cook County on Tuesday morning to face charges in the shooting death of African American teenager of 17, Laquan McDonald more than a year ago, as reported Chicago Tribune.

Jason Van Dyke, 37, turned himself in to Cook County prosecutor at 7:41 am at the criminal court of 26th St. and California Ave., records show. Van Dyke, kept his hands in his pockets, looked straight ahead and did not answer the questions reporters asked as he walked with his lawyer to the Criminal Court building Leighton. Van Dyke's fingerprints were taken at 8:29 am and he was placed in an individual cell under observation, according to the record. Van Dyke was unarmed, but brought an inhaler used to treat asthma.

Van Dyke was scheduled to appear at a bail hearing on Tuesday at noon.

Van Dyke is charged with first-degree murder for allegedly fatally shooting Laquan McDonald, "without legal justification and with the intent to kill or do great bodily harm," according to the criminal complaint filed against him.

A video camera shows Van Dyke getting out of your car and, within seconds, unloaded 16 bullets in McDonald, said lawyers for the McDonald family.

After the first shots left on the floor McDonald, Van Dyke opened fire repeatedly on his young body lying on the ground, which became a fetal position, according to lawyers.

Police reported McDonald had PCP or PCP in his body when he died, according to the case documents. The PCP, also known as "angel dust" - can produce its consumer becomes aggressive and combative.

Van Dyke, 37, remained in administrative functions with pay, pending the outcome of its investigation, since the incident occurred in October 2014.

It is the first time a police officer in Chicago receives fees for first degree murder for a fatal incident in service since almost 35 years.

Van Dyke would face a minimum of 20 years in prison if convicted of the charge of first degree murder.

Meanwhile, Van Dyke's wife, Tiffany, created a GoFundMe page for donations for her husband's bail. However, the site did not mention the name of her husband and described as a veteran of 15 years "fighting for freedom and justice.

"It is a highly regarded and respected officer," wrote Tiffany Van Dyke. "He was in a shooting that was widely publicized in the media and ask for your patience until the facts come out at trial. We want him to come home with his family during the legal process."

Until 11 am Tuesday, donors, most of them anonymous, gave more than \$ 10,000 of the \$ 80,000 that was requested. The site also had an attractive number of negative comments and, shortly after 11 am, it was eliminated.

Fact Sheet Regarding the Shooting of Laquan McDonald

Brief Facts and Timeline for the Incident and Investigation

- On October 20, 2014 at 41st and Pulaski, a Chicago police officer shot and killed a juvenile, Laquan McDonald, who was carrying a knife.
- The Independent Police Review Authority (IPRA), a civilian independent agency, is charged with investigating all officer-involved shootings. IPRA opened its investigation into this incident within hours of the shooting. Between Oct. 20 and Oct. 28, IPRA interviewed witnesses and collected evidence. On Oct. 29, the officer was stripped of his police powers.
- For every officer-involved shooting, IPRA sends the evidence to the Cook County State's Attorney so that state prosecutors can determine whether to pursue a criminal investigation. Several days after the incident, IPRA sent the evidence in this case, including the dash camera video, to the Cook County States Attorney's Office. The evidence was also later shared with the FBI and the Office of the U.S. Attorney as prosecutors initiated state and federal criminal investigation. Per standard practice, IPRA then suspended its administrative investigation so as not to interfere with the criminal investigation.
- On November 24, 2015, the Cook County States Attorney Anita Alvarez charged officer Van Dyke with first degree murder.
- That same day, the Chicago Police Department suspended him without pay.
- Once the criminal case has concluded, IPRA will resume and finish its administrative investigation.

Q&A

Q: Why wouldn't the city release the video?

A: The video is evidence in an active criminal investigation and a grand jury has been convened to determine whether criminal charges should be brought. We did not want to do anything that might interfere with the ongoing investigation. For example, releasing a video during a pending investigation has the potential to compromise eyewitness testimony because witnesses may adjust their testimony to fit what they or others perceive in the video. Not releasing evidence during an ongoing criminal investigation is consistent with the longstanding practice of federal, state and local law enforcement authorities. As we stated months ago, the City planned to release the video once the investigation had concluded.

Q: What is the status of IPRA's investigation into this incident?

A: IPRA started its investigation immediately after the shooting. After collecting evidence and interviewing witnesses, IPRA sent the evidence to state and federal prosecutors who initiated a

criminal investigation. Once the criminal investigation started, per standard practice, IPRA had to suspend its investigation so as not to interfere with the criminal proceedings.

- Q: Why was the Chicago Police Department able to suspend this officer without pay?
- A: The Chicago Police Department requires that officers be able to lawfully carry a firearm as a condition of their employment. After the Cook County State's Attorney charged Officer Van Dyke with first degree murder, the States Attorney revoked his Firearm Owner ID Card, making it clear that he can no longer lawfully carry a firearm. The officer was immediately suspended without pay.
- Q: When an officer is not currently facing criminal charges, as is true for Officer Dante Servin, what is the process for terminating that officer's employment?
- A: The Independent Police Review Authority is responsible for investigating all police-involved shooting incidents. When a criminal investigation emerges from the same incident, IPRA's investigation is placed on hold until the criminal investigation is complete. Once IPRA resumes its investigation, it may recommend an officer be terminated. At that point the Superintendent has 60 days to review the recommendation, and if he agrees, charges are filed with the Police Board. The Police Board will then hold a hearing and make a final determination.

Police Officer Jason Van Dyke went to the criminal court in Cook County on Tuesday morning to face charges in the shooting death of African American teenager of 17, Laquan McDonald more than a year ago, as reported Chicago Tribune.

Jason Van Dyke, 37, turned himself in to Cook County prosecutor at 7:41 am at the criminal court of 26th St. and California Ave., records show. Van Dyke, kept his hands in his pockets, looked straight ahead and did not answer the questions reporters asked as he walked with his lawyer to the Criminal Court building Leighton. Van Dyke's fingerprints were taken at 8:29 am and he was placed in an individual cell under observation,

according to the record. Van Dyke was unarmed, but brought an inhaler used to treat asthma.

Van Dyke was scheduled to appear at a bail hearing on Tuesday at noon.

Van Dyke is charged with first-degree murder for allegedly fatally shooting Laquan McDonald, "without legal justification and with the intent to kill or do great bodily harm," according to the criminal complaint filed against him.

A video camera shows Van Dyke getting out of your car and, within seconds, unloaded 16 bullets in McDonald, said lawyers for the McDonald family.

After the first shots left on the floor McDonald, Van Dyke opened fire repeatedly on his young body lying on the ground, which became a fetal position, according to lawyers.

Police reported McDonald had PCP or PCP in his body when he died, according to the case documents. The PCP, also known as "angel dust" - can produce its consumer becomes aggressive and combative.

Van Dyke, 37, remained in administrative functions with pay, pending the outcome of its investigation, since the incident occurred in October 2014.

It is the first time a police officer in Chicago receives fees for first degree murder for a fatal incident in service since almost 35 years.

Van Dyke would face a minimum of 20 years in prison if convicted of the charge of first degree murder.

Meanwhile, Van Dyke's wife, Tiffany, created a GoFundMe page for donations for her husband's bail. However, the site did not mention the name of her husband and described as a veteran of 15 years "fighting for freedom and justice.

"It is a highly regarded and respected officer," wrote Tiffany Van Dyke. "He was in a shooting that was widely publicized in the media and ask for your patience until the facts come out at trial. We want him to come home with his family during the legal process."

Until 11 am Tuesday, donors, most of them anonymous, gave more than \$ 10,000 of the \$ 80,000 that was requested. The site also had an attractive number of negative comments and, shortly after 11 am, it was eliminated.

A staggering moment for Chicago

The video takes your breath away.

It shows a figure, identified by prosecutors as 17-year-old Laquan McDonald, felled by gunfire as he walks away from a line of Chicago police cruisers along Pulaski Road.

McDonald writhes on the ground as a police officer continues to shoot. At one point, another officer steps close enough to kick what prosecutors say is a knife out of McDonald's hand.

It doesn't square with the story a police union spokesman told at the scene Oct. 20, 2014, the night McDonald died after being shot 16 times by Officer Jason Van Dyke.

FOP spokesman Pat Camden said McDonald was shot in the chest after he lunged at Van Dyke and his partner with a knife. "He is a very serious threat to the officers, and he leaves them no choice at that point to defend themselves," Camden said that night.

"When police tell you to drop a weapon, all you have to do is drop it."

Van Dyke was charged Tuesday with first-degree murder. Prosecutors said Van Dyke opened fire about six seconds after exiting his SUV; he emptied his 9 mm handgun in 14 to 15 seconds; he was reloading it when another officer told him to hold his fire.

A dashboard camera in one of the police cars captured the scene, including several seconds of McDonald lying crumpled in the road. Besides being hit in the chest, he was shot in the scalp, neck, elbow, leg, arms, hand and back.

Cook County State's Attorney Anita Alvarez said the video is unlike anything she has seen in three decades in law enforcement. She predicted it would "tear at the hearts of all Chicagoans."

It does.

The images are so disturbing that the City Council, acting on the recommendation of Mayor Rahm Emanuel's top attorney, approved a \$5 million settlement in April before McDonald's family even filed a lawsuit. The city fought for months to delay showing the video to the public. But a judge ordered it released.

That prompted Alvarez to move forward with the charge against Van Dyke on Tuesday, instead of waiting for federal authorities to complete a parallel investigation.

So now we've seen it. It is, as promised, staggering. City officials pleaded for calm as police braced for a long night. The protests had begun even as city officials were preparing to release the video, with a small group demonstrating outside the Burger King in the Archer Heights neighborhood where McDonald was shot.

They called for police Superintendent Garry McCarthy to be fired, for Emanuel to resign. The Rev. Jesse Jackson said Alvarez had taken too long to file charges and called for her to step down.

We share the protesters' anger. We understand their urge to hold public servants accountable. We expect them to make their voices heard. But it will take more than protests, more than the criminal prosecution of a single cop to repair the often fractious relationship between Chicago's police and its people.

This isn't about a stunning, isolated event. Zoom out, and it's part of a broader nationwide clamor over the use of lethal force by white cops against black suspects. Zoom in, and it's about Chicago's long-standing failure to deal effectively with rogue police officers.

Think back to the decades of systematic torture of suspects at the hands of Cmdr. Jon Burge and his crew, as prosecutors and police supervisors looked the other way. That stain will be with us for a long, long time. But the city also has a poor record for dealing with everyday allegations of police misconduct, from unprofessional behavior to unnecessary force.

A Tribune review of four years' worth of complaints against police officers found that just over 4 percent were sustained, and in nearly half of those cases, the officer was given a reprimand or a "violation noted." That's it. Some — perhaps most — complaints can't be proved. But the process is also hamstrung by union rules about how complaints are investigated and appealed. That explains, for example, why Van Dyke remained on paid desk duty for 13 months before he was charged with a crime. "We don't have at-will employees, and we can't just fire them as people expect," McCarthy reminded reporters at a Tuesday news conference before the video was released.

The Independent Police Review Authority, the civilian board that handles the most serious cases, doesn't take into account previous complaints against the same officer when investigating a new one. In the Tribune's analysis, 11 officers racked up a combined 253 complaints that resulted in a single five-day suspension. Come on. What does it take to flag a problem cop?

The system should have identified Van Dyke as a ticking time bomb. IPRA records show he was named in 17 citizen complaints — including three alleging excessive force — since 2006. All but two of them have been resolved, and none resulted in discipline.

Now, he's facing a first-degree murder charge.

It's not enough for Emanuel and McCarthy to urge calm. It's not enough to talk about the increased training and supervision that McCarthy says have dramatically reduced the number of police shootings on his watch. The mayor and his police chief must commit to a thorough examination and overhaul of the disciplinary process. That must come with a pledge for greater transparency, so the public can see for itself how complaints against cops are resolved.

Police officers deal with dangerous situations every day. But Chicago's history of slow or no disciplinary action creates the impression that misconduct goes unpunished. That has to change. The city must make good on its promise to put cameras in every cruiser and on every cop. And it must stop trying to hide those recordings from the public.

If not for the video, it's unlikely that Van Dyke would be facing a murder charge. Chicago wouldn't be having this important discussion.

In the coming days, that video will be viewed again and again. It will send citizens into the street — peacefully, we hope — and keep them up at night. Those images are deeply disturbing. Chicago needed to know exactly what happened.

Comcast Admits To Avoiding South Side Church Due To Area Violence

AUBURN GRESHAM — Fearing for the safety of its employees, Comcast canceled six appointments on Chicago's South Side Wednesday due to "heightened potential [for] violence" in the area, a company spokesman confirmed Wednesday.

A day after <u>holding 9-year-old Tyshawn Lee's funeral</u>, St. Sabina Church needed some help with its internet connection — and was turned away because of neighborhood violence.

Outspoken anti-violence activist Father Michael Pfleger shared his outrage about Comcast on Facebook Wednesday, writing: "A Supervisor at Comcast just informed us that they couldn't send their technician to repair our internet service today because our area has too much violence.....ARE YOU KIDDING ME?????? Oh Hell No!!!!!!!"

The appointment at St. Sabina's, as well as five others in the area, were canceled after Comcast heard from police that the area could see an uptick in violence, said Jack Segal, Comcast's regional vice president of communications for the Chicago area.

"We received police information that there was a heightened potential of violence in the neighborhood," Segal said. "In an effort to ensure the safety and security of our employees, we postponed six appointments in the neighborhood. We reached out proactively to the customers and worked to reschedule them."

Segal said Comcast employees would be back in the area on Thursday.

The South Side neighborhood near St. Sabina, 1210 W. 78th Place, has made international headlines since police say Tyshawn was <u>lured into an alley near his grandmother's house and executed</u>, possibly due to his father's gang ties.

The neighborhood has seen a <u>heavy police presence</u> since the shooting after rumors of retaliatory violence in the wake of Tyshawn's killing.

Segal said Comcast regularly communicates with police and other officials to ensure their service vans do not get in the way of special events or municipal work such as snow plowing.

Officer Veejay Zala, a Chicago Police Department spokesman, said sometimes companies reach out to the department looking for crime information about a specific area, but he was unaware of any communication between police and Comcast this week.

A Comcast employee was shot in an attempted robbery in South Shore in 2014.

"We serve each and every area of the city each and every day," Segal said.

Phillip Hunter, the Director of Community Employment at St. Sabina, reached out to the provider after experiencing internet problems next door to the church. Hunter said a technician was scheduled to come out Wednesday between 3 and 5 p.m., but about five minutes later he got a call back.

Comcast said they would need to reschedule "due to safety reasons" for the technicians, Hunter said. When he pressed them further, he was told "there's a lot of gang activity going on in the area" and said a technician could come between 8 and 10 a.m. Thursday. Hunter, who runs a GED class, said about 10 students were supposed to do classwork Wednesday and couldn't because of the internet woes. He said he wants it fixed for a 5:30 p.m. class Thursday.

"I just think it's discrimination. If we don't get a resolution to this situation and some form of apology for what I believe to be profiling" then they may switch internet providers.

Another employee of St. Sabina, who declined to be named, said he worked for Comcast in the 80s and police sometimes accompanied technicians to jobs because they would often get robbed.
